Roanoke, Va., Feb. 13.—The Norfolk & Western, 2 1/2 announced that they begin building a line into Kentucky for construction of a coal road.

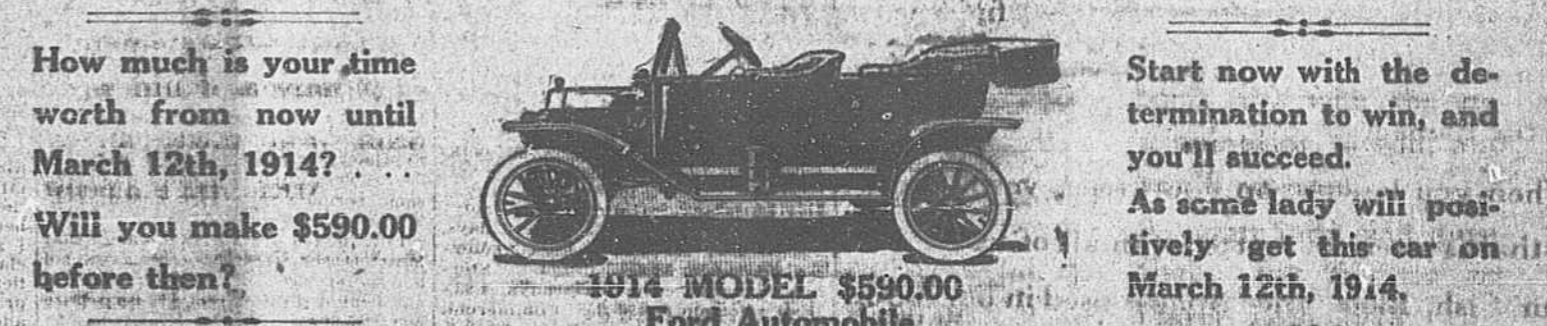
CHENE LONG DONE.

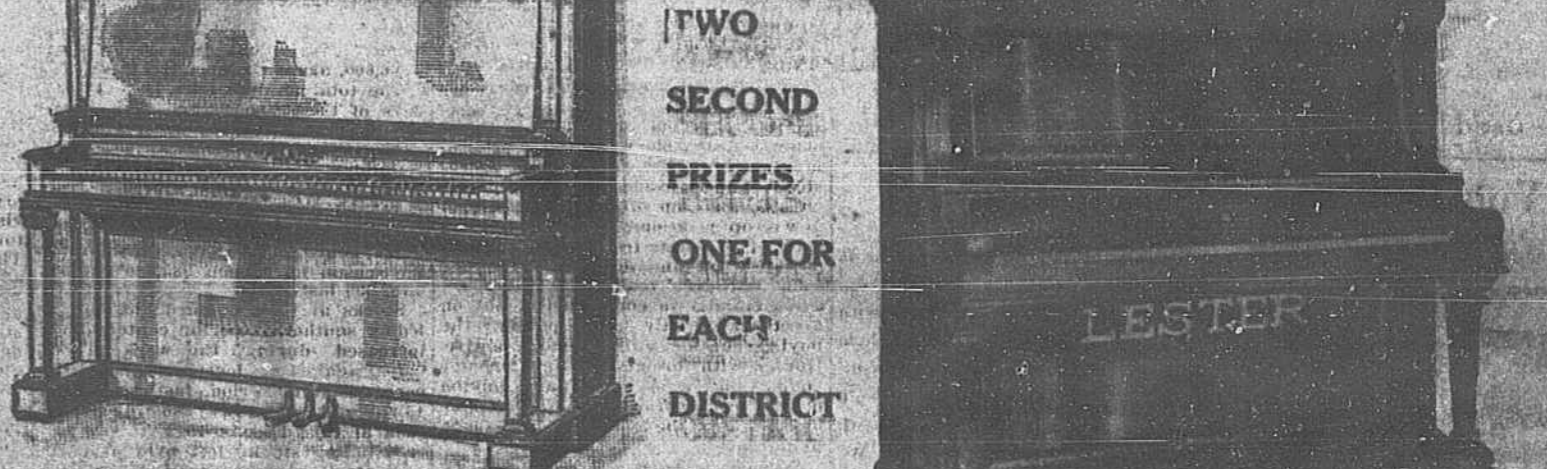

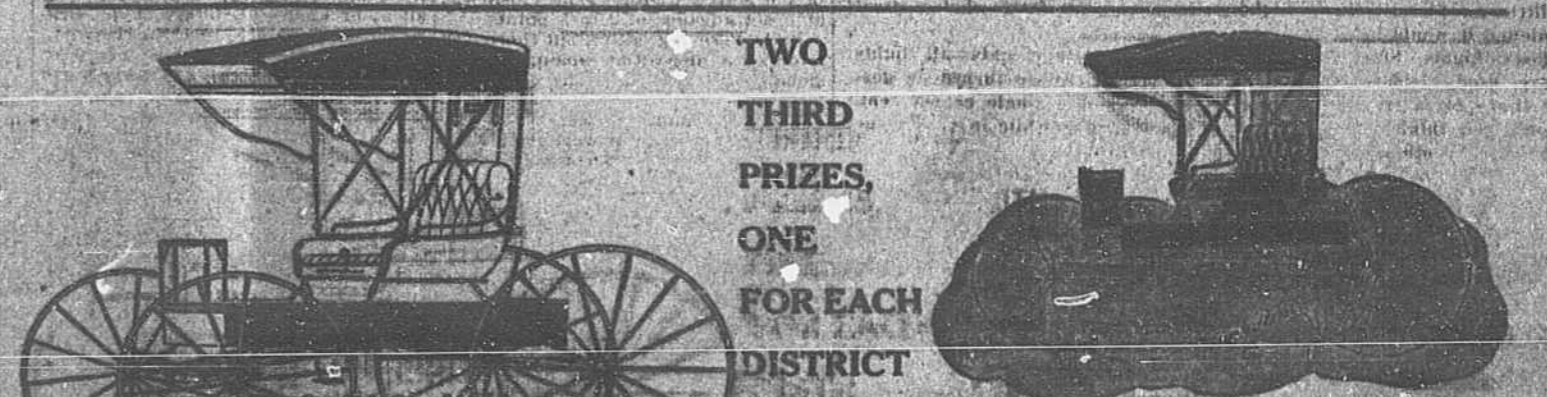
