TODD'S CLAIM KNOCKED IN HEAD

Columbia, Feb. 16.—Working steadily for five hours tonight and this afternoon the House passed the whole appropriation bill to third reading. Few changes were made in the measure as it came from the ways and means committee. All the appropriations for the State colleges were passed by the House.

The bill as it came from the ways and means committee appropriated \$2,391,795. As it passed the House it carried \$2,427,095. The State tax levy provided under the terms of the bill 7 mills, an increase of 3-4 of one mill over last year.

One or two items were decreased by the House. The appropriation for the Confederate infirmary was cut \$5,000 and the item providing for the payment of \$5,000 to Todd & Benson, architects of Charleston, for plans and a model of changes in the State house, was stricken out of the bill.

The bill was increased by the addition of an item of \$45,000 for a contingent fund for needy rural schools to be expended under the direction of the State board of education.

The only other item added was \$300 to be disbursed in payments of \$25 to the official designated to electrocute convicts at the State penitentiary.

The bill provides for the erection of a building at the State Institute at Caddo Springs to cost \$35,000; gives \$100,000 for a gymnasium and appropriates \$20,000 for a new building at the State Industrial School at Florence.

IN MEXICAN WATERS. No intention to increase the Battleships There.

Washington, Feb. 15.—The navy department has no present intention of increasing the naval force in Mexican waters, and today Secretary Daniels said he had ordered the battleships Rhode Island, Georgia, Nebraska and Virginia to leave Vera Cruz immediately upon the arrival there of the draughts from Florida and Delaware. The latter ships, late today were reported to be starting Vera Cruz. The vessels relieved will immediately steam across the Gulf of Mexico to join a fleet at Guantamayo Bay on the south coast of Cuba.

Walker, relict of the late C. C. "Sun" Walker, who served in that command. It will be necessary in getting some important matters settled for Mrs. Walker to have two of his comrades to state as witnesses that they knew the deceased and that he was a member of that command. Unfortunately the military history of Anderson county is in such poor shape that it is difficult to get information of this kind. Some old comrades please let Mrs. Walker hear from them. Mr. Walker enlisted in the Beauregard Artillery on the 6th of July, 1863 and served until the surrender. The captain of his battery was named Ferguson. Mr. Walker died on the 19th of January, 1913.

Speakers for Golden Jubilee.

Cullen Sullivan, two of the best known and most able orators in Anderson have been selected as the speakers for the Golden Jubilee of the Knights of Pythias, which will be held Thursday night. He was a salesman on the road for many years and was regarded with respect and affection throughout this portion of South Carolina. His son married Miss Nardin, sister of Dr. W. H. Nardin of this city. Col. Hoke was a gallant Confederate soldier and was a warm personal friend of Gen. L. A. Bead of this city, who was very much affected by the news of the death of his friend.

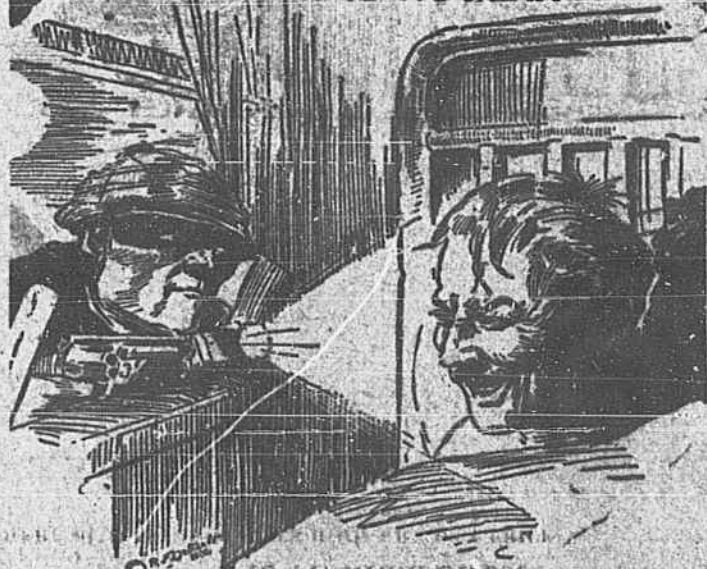
