Plans Changed.
Not anticipating such an enthusiastic response on the part of the mill workers of the city, those who planned the night textile school had intended holding all classes in Cecil's Business School but the attendance on the first night of the school clearly showed that this would be impossible, since there were nearly twice as many students enrolled as had been anticipated.

Therefore the plan of dividing the classes up has been hit upon and the elementary classes of Brogon Mill will hereafter meet at the Brogon mill school, where their instructor will be and the elementary class of the Anderson mill will meet at the Anderson mill schoolhouse. However, all of the classes in mill calculations, mechanical drawing and textile designing will continue to meet at the Cecil Business school.

Those who have this work in charge say that they were very much encouraged over the first night and that they now feel the possibilities of the work they have undertaken to be far greater than they had even dreamed of when the plans for this night school were first formulated.

The Anderson High School basketball team will journey to Westminister Saturday afternoon, this weather permitting, and proceed upon their arrival there, to lift the scalp of the five contenders from the Westminister High School. Play is to be called promptly at 3:20 o'clock and the local boys will be accompanied by a number of high school "rooters" from here. The Anderson boys feel confident that they will give a splendid account of themselves and feel that the game is already a good one won.

Travelers Go To Greenville.
A number of the traveling men of Anderson have received invitations to be present at the quarterly meeting of the Greenville chamber of commerce, which takes place tomorrow night. The program for this meeting is devoted entirely to the traveling men of Greenville and vicinity and in their honor an informal smoker, followed by a luncheon, will take place. Anderson will have several representatives at the smoker if none of the present plans miscarry.

Lieut. Bowen To Report at Greenwood.

POSTAGE CAN NOW BE C. O. D.

Stamps on Letter From Anderson to Columbia Can Be Paid For at Other End

Not many Anderson people know that they can now send a letter without a postage stamp from Anderson to Columbia or any other city without a stamp and have the party to whom the letter is addressed pay for it at the other end, but such is the case. This may be news to the officials of the Anderson postoffice, but is a fact.

Under a recent ruling of the post-office department letters which are mailed without postage stamps will be delivered to the person to whom they are addressed provided the addressee is willing to pay double the regular postage. In other words a letter that ordinarily requires two cents postage affixed at the point of mailing will be delivered at its destination upon payment of 4 cents by the addressee. Until this order became effective it was the rule of the department to hold all mail without postage until the sender could be notified. It has long been the custom to forward all mail matter of the first class to destination if part postage was paid at point of mailing, requiring the addressee to pay the remainder due, but the delivery of letters which have been mailed with no stamp is an innovation.

It is not the desire of the postoffice officials to encourage the adoption of this plan by the public, but it was introduced for the benefit of business men and firms who mail letters in quantities and often overlook the placing of a stamp on a few pieces. Knowing that some times these letters deal with matters of utmost importance, the new regulation regarding their delivery upon payment of double postage by recipient was ordered.
