The notice from the office of the collector of internal revenue is dated Jan 1, 1914 and reads as follows:
"Notice is hereby served that every person of lawful age having a net in-come of \$3,000 or over during the present calendar year, is subject to the income tax law, and is required to make and render to the collector of internal revenue, Columbia, S. C., on or before March 1, 1914, a true and accurate return of annual income upon the blanks prescribed by the internal revenue department. Said blanks may be obtained by addressing a request to the collector of internal revenue, Columbia S. C. Failure to re return on or before the date mentioned will not be considered a valid excuse for failure to make the return.
