LOCAL PLUTOCRATS MUST PAY ON INCOME

Fines Imposed If Return Is Not Made.

THE TIME LIMIT

Returns Will Not Be Accepted After This Week and Fines Are \$20 to \$7,000.

Those Anderson people who happen to have a plentiful supply of this world's goods an ordinarily feel pretty proud of that fact but here is what the poor man laughs at the bloated bondholder. All those Anderson people who fail to make a return on their income before the end of the week will have cause to regret it.

The income tax law is effective March 1 and will be rigidly enforced by the government. Every citizen of the United States whether residing at home or abroad, every person residing in the United States and every non-resident alien who has income from United States investments of \$3,000 or more must make a return.

Wm. G. McAdoo, secretary of the treasury is of the opinion that postmasters and others in the government postal service who receive salaries of \$3,000 per annum are subject to payment of an income tax.

South Carolinians who have an annual net income of \$3,000 or more will be notified by Duncan C. Heyward, United States collector of internal revenue, at Columbia, that they are subject to the Federal income tax. A notice to this effect has been posted in every postoffice in South Carolina.

The notice from the office of the collector of internal revenue is dated Jan 1, 1914 and reads as follows:

"Notice is hereby served that every person of lawful age having a net income of \$3,000 or over during the present calendar year, is subject to the income tax law, and is required to make and render to the collector of internal revenue, Columbia, S. C. on or before March 1, 1914, a true and accurate return of annual income upon the blanks prescribed by the internal revenue department. Said blanks may be obtained by addressing a request to the collector of internal revenue, Columbia, S. C. Failure to receive the said blanks for making the return on or before the date mentioned will not be considered a valid excuse for failure to make the return, and all of the penalties named in the act will be imposed for failure to make a return of income under this law."

Specific Exemptions

For the past year, 1913, specific exemptions will be \$2,500 or \$3,333.33 in the case of a married person, and in the future year \$3,000 and \$4,000. Where the tax has been withheld in part of the income source, or where part of the income comes as dividends upon stock of a corporation, taxable under the corporation tax section of the law, the regulations set forth that such income shall be deducted from the individual's total net income when computing the amount of which he is taxable.

The law imposes a tax of 1 per cent and provides that individuals who in the case of income between \$20,000 and \$50,000 shall pay an additional tax of 1 per cent on such amount; on all between \$50,000 and \$75,000, 2 per cent; \$75,000 to \$250,000, 4 per cent; \$250,000 to \$500,000, 5 per cent and all over \$500,000, 6 per cent. Return must be in the hands of the collector of internal revenue in the district where the payee lives or where he has his principal business, not later than March 1, failure to observe this limit to be punished with fine ranging from \$20 to \$1,000.

Refusal or neglect to file returns, except in cases of sickness or absence will result in an addition of 50 per cent to the tax assessed. In the case of a person who neglects to file a return, and any person required to make, render, sign or verify such return, who makes a false or fraudulent, with intent to defraud or evade the tax, will be guilty of misdemeanor and will be subject to a fine of not more than \$2,000 or imprisonment for one year, or both.

SOLICITOR IS NOT CHOSEN

Rumor in Anderson Yesterday Said That John B. Adger Mullaly Got Plum.

A rumor was heard in Anderson yesterday morning to the effect that Governor Blease had appointed as solicitor for the new Thirteenth circuit, John Bailey Adger Mullaly, a member of the Ogeesee bar. However, a telegram from Columbia last night advised that Judge T. J. Mauldin said no solicitor had yet been appointed for the new district.

Anderson lawyers and others are presently endeavoring to elect a solicitor for this position and local people seem to believe that Mr. Smith will win.

LENTE PERIOD BEGAN YESTERDAY

FIELD AGENT FOR SOUTHERN RAILROAD Has Selected W. J. Shely to Succeed W. H. Baker.

INTERURBAN LINE IS PRACTICALLY SURE

Proposition Is Up to the City of Anderson.

ABBEVILLE HUSTLES

Construction on First Link of Seven-teen Miles Will Soon Be Started by Abbeville.

J. K. Wilkinson, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce of Abbeville, who attended the annual meeting of the local commercial organization on Tuesday night, held a conference here yesterday afternoon with A. S. Farmer, chairman of the railroad extension committee of the Chamber of Commerce, with reference to the plans of the Northwestern Electric Railway Company, projected between Eastley via Anderson and Abbeville to August 1st. A representative of the Daily Intelligencer was unable to see Mr. Farmer yesterday, but a conversation with Secretary Wilkinson brings out the fact that this new interurban development is getting down to real business and that prospects for early construction are splendid. He said that a great meeting would be held at Abbeville on March 4th, at which time enough money would be raised in and near Abbeville to build the first link of the line from Abbeville, 17 miles. This done, and the proposition would be up to Anderson to build the connecting link between Anderson and Antreville. Secretary Wilkinson says that Abbeville is assured that Anderson will do her part. Abbeville anticipates placing the new road under construction within the next 90 to 120 days, and to have the line in operation to Antreville by fall. The handling of this matter locally is proceeding nicely, and Anderson is prepared to do her part, and to secure this additional interurban.

Mr. Farmer and representative of the local committee will attend the Abbeville meeting March 4th.
