Cleveland, O., Feb. 28.—The second squad of Naps leave for their spring training camps at Athens, Ga., today. It is uncertain whether second baseman Lajoie will accompany them, as his wife's illness necessitated his being quarantined.

Hot Springs, Ark., Feb. 28.—The squad of Brooklyn superstars which has been training here for the past two weeks will leave today to join manager Robinson at Annapolis tomorrow.

Chicago, Ill., Feb. 28.—Manager Tim Lincecum and twenty men of the Chicago Cubs will leave today for Mineral Wells, Tex.

Detroit, Mich., Feb. 28.—The Tigers leave here today for Gullport, Miss., where their spring training camp has been pitched.

Beaumont, Tex., Feb. 28.—The Beaumont baseball players will report to Manager Ledy here tomorrow.

Houston, Tex., Feb. 28.—All the Yankee players and Manager Frank Chance are expected to begin training here tomorrow. Daly, the famous backstop, will act as coach to the pitchers, and as scout in midsummer.

Jacksonville, Fla., Feb. 28.—The Athletics will open their training quarters here Monday.

Macon, Ga., Feb. 28.—The Pilgrims with Manager George Stallings, will start work here tomorrow.

Joseph Weil, the former Boston National player, has been selected to manage the 70-man club of the Virginia State League.

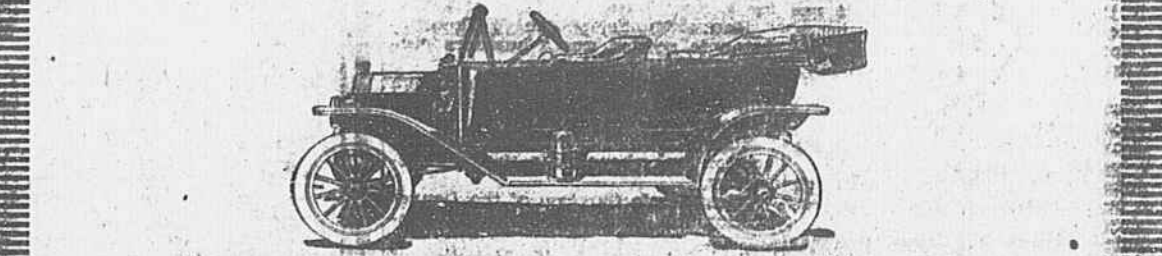
Increased Confederate Pensions.

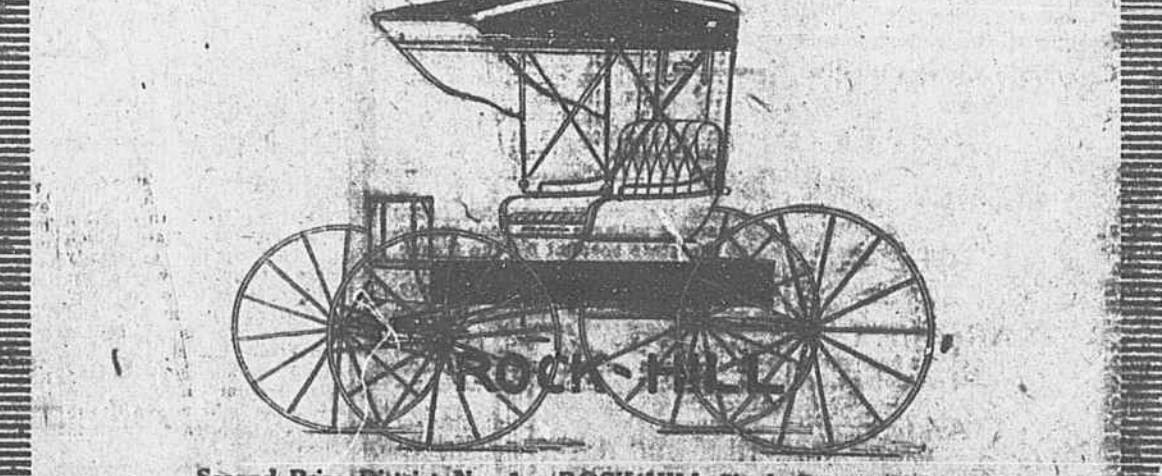

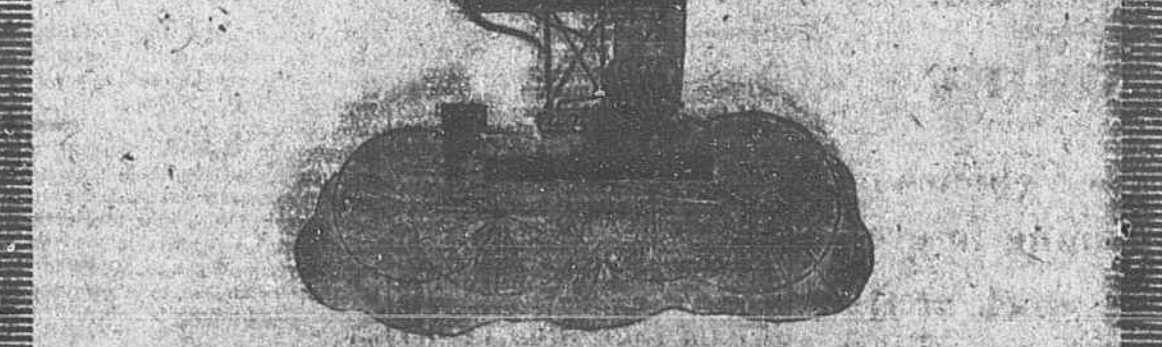
