THE MARKETS New York Cotton

New York, March 5.—The steadier tone which developed in the cotton market yesterday was in evidence again during today's trading. Demand was not general, but there appeared to be few sellers around the ring, and prices worked higher on firmer cables, favorable India trade advices, reports of a steady spot situation and predictions of rather bullish week-end figures tomorrow. The close was steady, net unchanged to 8 points higher, active months being generally 4 to 8 points above yesterday's close.

The market was relatively active during the early trading. Liverpool attributed business there to good trade demand and continental buying of new crop months. Houses with English connections were buyers here at the opening advance of 4 to 8 points, and the market sold 7 to 9 points net higher during early trading. Prices eased off somewhat around noon, but the market showed a generally steady tone and closed within a point or two of the best. Spot cotton quiet; middling uplands, 12.00; gulf, 12.25. No sales. Cotton futures closed steady. March opened 12.17, closed 12.16. May opened 11.69, closed 11.72. July opened 11.66, closed 11.70. October opened 11.35, closed 11.34.

New Orleans Cotton

New Orleans, March 5.—The large export movement was the main influence in the cotton market today. It caused moderate buying for the long account and increased the desire of shorts to realize profits. The market closed steady at about the highest of the day, at a net gain of 7 to 10 points. From the first profit taking on the short side was the best support of the market. Rather low temperatures in the western belt and reports of backwardness in planting in the earliest counties of Texas encouraged buying of October.

The market stood at a small net advance on all months throughout the session. Bulls were encouraged by cables from English authorities on consumption, confirming large estimates previously made. Spot cotton steady and unchanged. Middling, 12.25. Sales on the spot, 2,200; to arrive, 600. Cotton futures closed: March 12.49; May 12.55; July 12.36; August 11.82; October 11.50; December 11.50.

Liverpool Cotton

Liverpool, March 5.—Specialist's market, steady; middling, 6.68; good middling, 6.63; good ordinary, 6.51; ordinary, 5.31. Sales, 15,000, including 33,200 American and 2,000 for speculation and export. Receipts, 5,000, including 600 American. Futures closed steady.

Cotton Seed Oil

New York, March 5.—Cotton seed oil was firm early today with a slight upward trend, but eased off a trifle toward the close under hedge selling and lack of outside demand. Final prices were unchanged to 1 lower on near and 4 points higher on late. The market closed steady. Total sales, 5,200.

Money Market

New York, March 5.—Call money steady, 1 3/4-4 1/2. Time loans firmer: sixty days, 3; ninety days, 3 1/4; six months, 3 1/2-4 1/4. Mercantile paper, 4 1/2-5. Sterling exchange, easy: sixty days, 45 1/2; three months, 45 1/2. Commercial bills, 45 1/2. Bar silver, 52 1/2. Mexican dollars, 45 1/2. Government bonds, firm; railroad bonds, irregular.

Stocks and Bonds

New York, March 5.—Closing quotations today showed general weakness, which were largest among railroad stocks. The market made a small advance in early trading. Steel stocks, yesterday's strong points, were again favorites, while buying appeared to be largely on the nature of short covering. There was a moderate amount of individual trading. As Chesapeake and Ohio's surplus for the last fiscal year, after payment of dividends, was only \$150,000, it was thought new obligations impaired the prospect of continued dividend payments, and this was sold off abruptly. It fell to 55 1/2, a loss of 5 points, and closed with only a fractional recovery. The decline depressed the general railroad firm considerably. Other shares were heavy on less favorable trade reports. Some issues closed sharply. Total sales, 1,500,000. United States copper bonds advanced 1/2 on call. Total sales were 20,000.

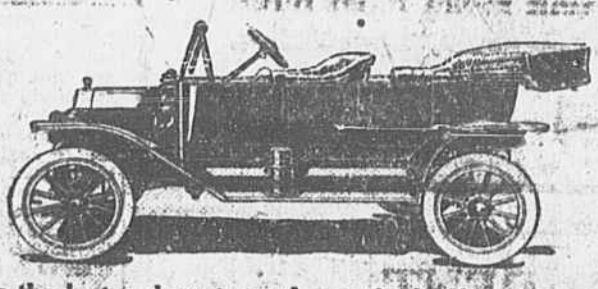
Chicago Grain

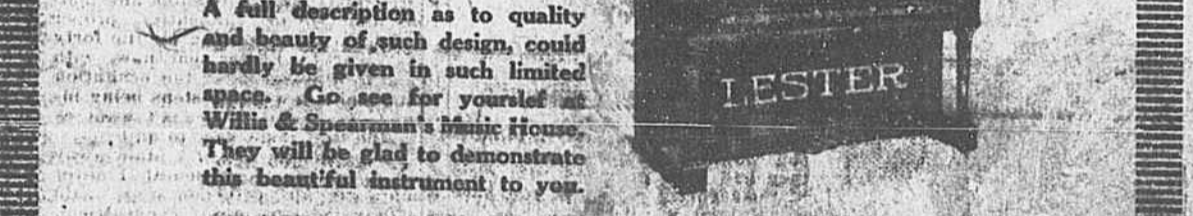

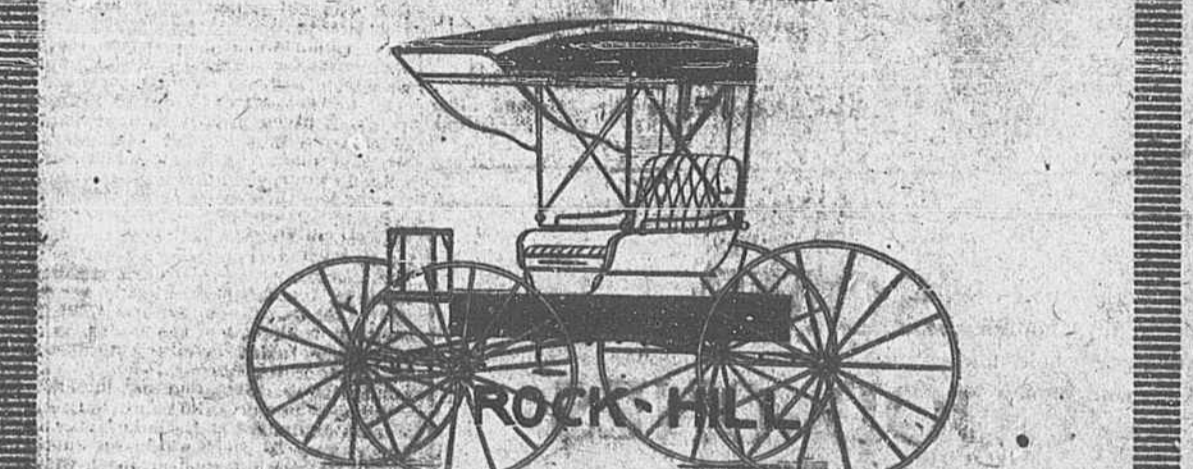

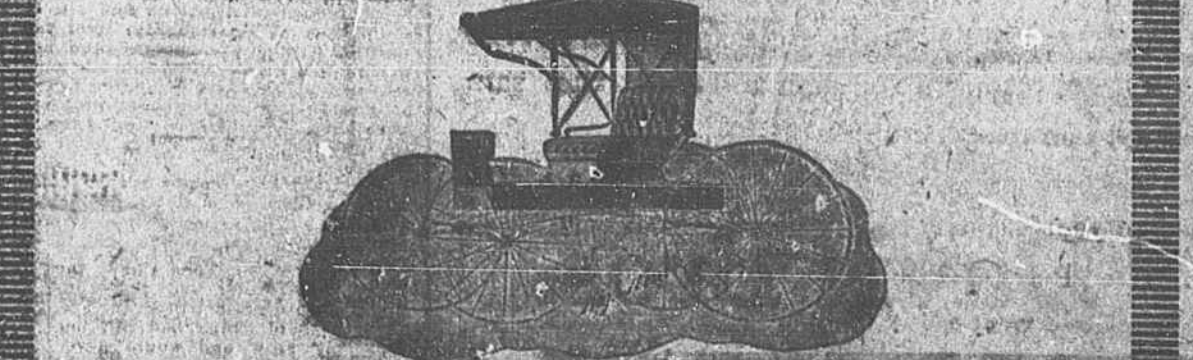
