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Atlanta Letter

Atlanta, March 10.-With the idea of carrying out further the provisions of the state law regarding the boys' reformatory at Milledgeville, and further developing the usefulness of that institution along the line prescribed, the Georgia prison commission is planning to take steps to introduce extensively the work of constructing chairs and other articles of furniture, of reeds, canes, rattans and similar materials, thus adding a profitable branch to the institution and at the same time giving another means whereby the inmates may learn a useful trade that will make them self-supporting when they are turned back into the world.

All the members of the prison commission, Messrs. R. E. Davison, T. E. Patterson and E. L. Raley are in favor of the above and further consideration confirms their present opinions of the practicality of the subject, the new department will be inaugurated.

The state law provides that the prison commission may, in their discretion, establish and maintain in connection with the institution a system of manual training and instruction in trades, and may create such industries, productive or otherwise, as are, in their opinion, to the best advantage of the inmates.

Adopt Colored Wigs - Atlanta, March 10.-Atlanta society girls have decided to adopt the new colored wigs as a part of elaborate evening costumes, and it is rumored that two or three well-known belles will appear at the next ball at the Driftin Club, with pink, cream and purple locks to match their gowns.

Wigs of all shades and colors are on display here at the leading stores. Whether the wigs are simply a passing fad or whether they will be a permanent feature of women's attire remains to be seen. Some authorities on dress declare that the new wigs are an absolute necessity if the full beauty of certain new gowns is to be brought out.

Paid Beautiful Tribute - Atlanta, March 10.-A beautiful tribute to a well known Georgia woman, Mrs. W. J. Harris, wife of the late U. S. senator, and daughter of the late General Joe Wheeler, is being given by another well known Georgia woman, the writer, Selena Armstrong Harmon, in an article written in Washington, which has just appeared in the "Nation".

"Some women have a positive genius for motherhood," says the writer, "and Mrs. William J. Harris is such a woman and such a mother. Her interests center in the rearing and training of a small daughter with a flower-like face, and every subject that touches her is treated with a child's interest to her."

Woodward for Governor - Atlanta, Mar. 10.-A boom to make Uncle Jim "Woodward" governor of Georgia has been started in Atlanta, and is taken seriously enough by many of the mayor's friends.

Uncle Jim himself smiles wisely and says nothing when the subject is mentioned to him, but he is certainly interested much further, to see him make formal announcement of his candidacy for the gubernatorial chair.

His friends declare he would run a powerful race against his enemies, who have no peace as long as he is in Atlanta, declare they would gladly vote for him in order to get him out of city politics.

They say the mayor's policy of strict economy and business-like methods would apply with equal force to the handling of the state's affairs."

Rescued S. C. Disposition - Atlanta, March 10.-Police court this morning sentenced a "state" dispenser in South Carolina in this days when the Palmetto state was acting as bar-tender to the negroes. The court room was literally filled with stacked-up boxes and crates and jars and bottles of whiskey, confiscated in Sunday raids on local blind tigers.

A dozen or more offenders against the prohibition law were reviewed in the morning court and to every instance caught heavy sentences.

A large group of spectators gathered for the "show" and "gazed" in thirsty amazement at the quantity of confiscated liquor.
