### Financial and Commercial

#### New York Cotton

New York, March 16.—An early advance, caused by a report that the government was considering a movement today, but considerable reaction was encountered and moderate reaction followed. The market was not unchanged to 6 points higher on near months, while near deliveries were 2 to 4 points lower. There was a renewal of the old covering movement of the market. Cable news about as due on the New York case of Saturday, which once again advised from the South indicated a continued demand for spot cotton. There was heavy buying here by foreign houses. First prices were five points lower on April, but generally 3 to 4 points higher, and active old crop positions sold 8 to 10 points higher during the early trading. The contracts touched 13 1/2 to 14 points above the low records of last week. Much of the early demand apparently was for the purpose of covering short positions here against the liquidation of long accounts in Liverpool and at other points. The market set record demand, because, less activity. March had well above the level prices of last week, and local traders said there was little sign of any selling here against pending shipments from the South. This apparent absence of spot pressure, combined with the reports that stocks of interior towns were being rapidly accumulated with last year, gave the market a comparatively steady undertone, and closing prices showed rallies of 2 to 3 points on covering.
