MEXICAN REFUGEES Their Right to Enter United States To Be Tested.

Washington, April 3.—Instructions to hold up under immigration laws any of the Mexican refugees interned at Fort Bliss, who may be released pending habeas corpus proceedings, have been sent by Commissioner Callahan to border inspectors. In case the habeas corpus is granted, the refugees will be immediately returned and their right to enter the United States tested.
