K. A. Smith, New York City, expert pianist, gave a concert at the Anderson, S. C.

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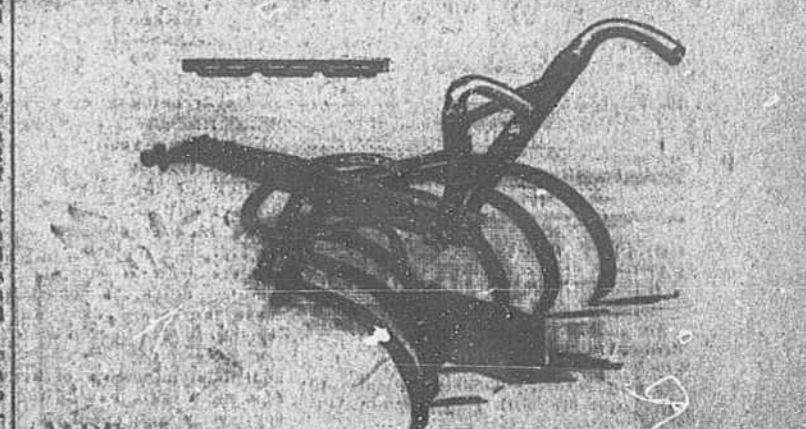
