

Items of Interest and Personal Mention Caught Over the Wireless on the Streets of Anderson

**Musicians Will Give a Recital.**  
For the benefit of the Ladies Civic Association of Anderson, Webb von Hasseln, accompanied by his friend, Mr. Grahl of Germany, will give a concert in the chamber of commerce room next Thursday evening. The event will be one of the best musical attractions Anderson has enjoyed this season. Mr. von Hasseln is an accomplished musician, having studied under some of the most famous violin masters of the old country. Mr. Grahl plays the cello and the two will give a splendid program next week. Both these men have national reputations and Anderson people should feel that they are fortunate in having this opportunity of hearing the recital. An added attraction is the fact that Mr. von Hasseln is a native of Anderson and has many relatives here. An effort was made to have the recital in the auditorium of Anderson college but the ladies could not secure the place, so the event will take place in the rooms of the chamber of commerce.

**Wets' Must Soon Show Their Hand.**  
The people of Anderson county who are behind the agitation for the re-formation of the county will soon have to show their hand. The law says that in order to secure an election on the question of a petition bearing the signatures of at least one-third of the qualified voters of the county must be presented to the supervisor before the first day of May. It is understood that the people in favor of the dispensary are holding all their energies to getting the required number of signatures before the last day of this month. The general opinion seems to be that the wets may succeed in getting a sufficient number of signatures but will not be able to carry the election.

**Good Friday Is Observed Today.**  
Today is Good Friday, and as such will be observed in some of the Anderson churches. The pastors of the various churches where the day is observed have arranged programs for services and a large number of Anderson people will attend. All over the country Good Friday is observed each year by certain religious bodies and it is annually a church affair of much importance.

**Cold Weather Did Arrive.**  
The cold weather predicted for this section of the country made its appearance last night, getting to Anderson near the close of the afternoon. Overcoats were hunted up again and fires were rekindled in the homes of the city. Considerable complaint was heard from those who had been so unwise as to make a change of their clothing in anticipation of the coming of Summer.

**Expected Today.**  
Approximately 100 Greenwood business men will arrive in Anderson between noon and 1 o'clock today, spending an hour here. The party is to make the trip in automobiles, headed by the brass band of the Bailey Military Institute. The Greenwood people will take dinner in Anderson and it will be a difficult undertaking for the hotels and the cafes of Anderson to feed this number of people in the short time that they will be here.

**Buying Up More Land.**  
The Anderson Real Estate & Investment Co., yesterday closed a deal for the Rodgers property, consisting of 15 acres. The property was purchased from Rev. G. M. Rodgers and it is understood that the price was \$500 per acre. The real estate company will at once begin the work of developing this property and will push it as they have other lands recently acquired.

**Health Department Of Civic Association.**  
The Health Department of the Civic Association will meet this afternoon at 4 o'clock with Mrs. C. S. Minor at 1641 South McDuffie street. Considerable business of importance will be up for consideration and action this afternoon will be taken on several important matters.

**Anderson Schools Closing Baseball.**

The game was splendid throughout and the youngsters did some good work. Hixitt and H. Snow composed the battery for the Kennedy street school while McCover and Barton officiated for North Past. A return engagement will probably be played between the same two schools at an early date and the lovers of this sport say that there will be a different story to tell next time.

**Wife Got Her Husband In Trouble.**  
E. A. Hutchison, a well known member of the Anderson county who is now able to be out on the streets after having been confined to his home for some time. Mr. Wilson has been suffering from an injury to his right hand and for a time it was feared that an operation might be necessary. That he is improving and will soon be recovered will be welcomed by his friends.

**Wife Got Her Husband In Trouble.**  
E. A. Hutchison, a well known member of the Anderson county, was yesterday committed to the Anderson county jail where he will have to stay until he can get some one to furnish a \$300 bond for him. Hutchison was arrested on a warrant issued out by his wife, Mrs. Sallie Hutchison. The man's three weeks, during which time he has been continually drunk, he has made repeated efforts to do her bodily harm. She alleges that only a night or two ago he tried to kill her with a knife he had snatched up the dining table. When arraigned before the

magistrate yesterday Hutchison could not give the necessary \$300 bond and it is uncertain how long it will be before he can get any one else to furnish it for him. Meanwhile he is confined in jail.

The Anderson-Havana Cigar Co. will place its wares on sale at the various stores of the city tomorrow morning, according to an announcement made by the proprietors of the place yesterday. One of the leading brands to be manufactured by the company will be the "Anderson cigar" and it is expected that it will prove popular around the city.

The show windows of the various business houses in the city are being decorated for the coming of Easter. Many of them being very attractive. The Owl Drug store yesterday had three fine rabbits in one of the show windows at the popular drug store and they attracted much interest from passers-by. The candy display at Evans Drug store No. 1 is also very attractive.

**Philatheas Had Their Hands Full.**  
The Philatheas classes had their hands full in Anderson yesterday, one class conducting the candy and fruit sale at the Olympia Candy and Ice Cream parlor, while the last turkey dinner of the season was being served at the Hillman building by another class. The ladies said last night that they had done remarkably well in both these undertakings and that their treasuries would be considerably enriched as a result of their labors. All day long both the places were crowded and Anderson people patronized both places in a splendid manner.

**GOOD FRIDAY.**  
Three-hour Service at Grace Episcopal Church Today.

In addition to the morning service at 10:30 and the evening service at 8:30, the Three Hour Service will be conducted in Grace Church on Good Friday.

The service starts at 12 (noon) and continues until 3 p. m. The service is in commemoration of the three hours of darkness that covered the earth while our Lord suffered on the Cross. Now, from the sixth hour there was darkness over all the land until the ninth hour. St. Matt. 27:45

The service is divided into seven sections, each section consisting of hymns, prayers, one of the Penitential Prayers and a meditation upon the words from the Cross.

1. The Cross of Forgiveness. "Father forgive them; for they know not what they do."
2. The Cross of Rest. "Today shall thou be with me in Paradise."
3. The Cross of Love. "Woman, behold thy son!" "Behold thy mother!"
4. The Cross of Spiritual Anguish. "My God, my God, why hast Thou forsaken Me?"
5. The Cross of Physical Anguish. "I thirst."
6. The Cross of Contentment. "It is finished."
7. The Cross of Trust. "Father, into Thy Hands I commend My Spirit!" Conclusion: "In the Cross of Christ I glory."

Each section of the service commences and ends with a hymn and those who attend this service can enter and leave during the singing of these hymns. Thus a person can stay for one or more sections if not for the whole service.

All Christians who wish to keep this day Good Friday in commemoration of the Crucifixion are asked to attend this service of praise to it.

**Wilson Changed Plans for Easter.**  
Washington, April 10.—Plans for President Wilson's Easter outing were changed today. The party will go to White Sulphur Springs, W. Va., instead of Hot Springs as previously announced at the White House. The purpose is to afford Mrs. Wilson a rest and an opportunity to recuperate from her recent illness. The President will leave Thursday night spending Friday, Saturday and Sunday at White Sulphur.
