Why Levy Here Is Very High. Sam Martin, who is now making his home in Georgia and at the same time making a success of farming in the "cracker" state is spending a few days in Anderson county with friends and relatives. Mr. Martin says that frequently South Carolina people are heard to complain of the fact that the tax levy is higher in this State than it is in Georgia. He goes on to say that South Carolina people lose sight of the fact that land valuation in Georgia is much higher than it is in this State and says that therein lies the explanation of the discrepancy.

Barbers Won't Have The Sanitary Towels. One of the principal barbers of the city told a reporter for The Intelligencer yesterday that he did not have any idea of complying with orders issued by Dr. J. C. Mitchell, city meat inspector, in regard to the use of a sterilizer for towels in the barber shops. This barber said that he had had experience with these sterilizers and that only about 12 towels were used all day in many so different. He said that in systems could not compare with the present method when it came to cleanliness and that he did not intend putting in such an apparatus as was recommended.

Farm Man Saw School Plot. J. W. Rothrock, farm demonstrator for Anderson county, visited the Lebanon school yesterday and went over the farm demonstration plot at that institution. Mr. Rothrock says that the pupils of the Lebanon school have done splendidly with the ground entrusted to them and that the cover crops there will soon be ready for turning under, so that cotton and corn may be planted. He hopes that it may be possible to plant the two last-named crops before the school session comes to an end so that the pupils of the school may see for themselves the results of their labors.

Prof. Burgess At The Denver School. An enjoyable event for the pupils of the Denver school was the splendid address delivered by Prof. J. M. Burgess of Clemson college last Thursday. Mr. Burgess told the pupils of the dairy cattle work in this State and explained to them what Clemson college is trying to do for the farmers. He received splendid attention from the boys and girls and they seemed to be interested in what he was discussing.

Woman Let "Hubby" Out. Some days ago Mrs. Sannie Hutchison came to Magistrate Broadwell and formed him that her husband had threatened to kill her and had in fact made several attempts in that direction and said that she was afraid for him to be at large. She petitioned the Magistrate to give her a warrant so that the officer have her husband arrested. At the time Mr. Broadwell told her that he was familiar with such cases and that if the man were arrested she would be back within a week to get him out of jail. This the woman denied and accordingly Hutchison was arrested and thrown in jail. Yesterday Mrs. Hutchison appeared and said that she supposed three days in jail would do her husband as much good as three weeks and she therefore paid the costs in the case in order to get him released.

Acquitted Of "Selling" Charge. J. L. Bradberry, a well known white man of the Fork section of Anderson county, was arraigned in Magistrate Bradwell's court yesterday on a charge of selling liquor. The Magistrate fully investigated the case, but after hearing all the evidence and examining all witnesses he was forced to discharge the defendant "for want of evidence."

ANDERSON GOODS SURPASS OTHERS Company Could Not Buy Goods Abroad But Found Them Here At Home

Senator Trickett, who is connected with the Anderson Petroleum Oil Company office said yesterday that he was now convinced of the truth of the saying "It pays to trade at home." For some time the Anderson company has been trying to find an oil can for their use that would exactly measure five gallons. They had samples sent here from all parts of the country, some of the biggest manufacturers of cans used by them, but not a single can would exactly meet the requirements of the local company. They either held some over five gallons or some under that amount and these would not do. Finally application was made to W. S. Dwyer & Son, an Anderson firm of established reputation and this resulted in the Petroleum Co. obtaining just exactly what was desired. The cans made by the Anderson people hold to the United States regulations under the ruling of the Commissioner of Agriculture. Officials of the local company were jubilant over getting just what they wanted and straightway they ordered 25 of these cans to be sent to the Greenville and Spartanburg offices of the concern. All of which goes to show that goods as good as any made can be purchased right here at home and possibly at a little better price.
