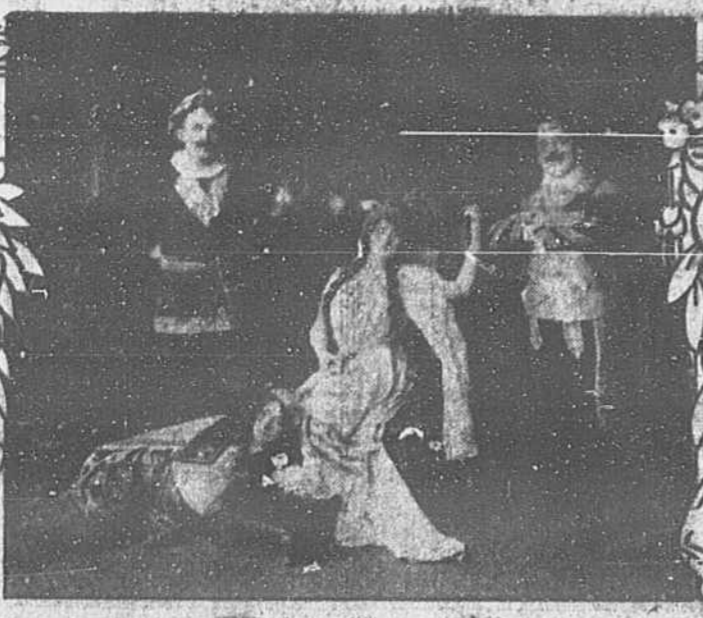

CLEMENT TRIAL ON THURSDAY

Young Couple are Charged With Murder of Two-Months Old Baby

Spartanburg, April 21.—Clyde Clement, the college boy who has been in jail here since February 2, jointly charged with Miss Blada Pendleton, a girl telegrapher, with the murder of a two-months-old baby found drowned, will be put on trial Thursday.

Frequently swallowing and moistening his lips but otherwise showing no signs of nervous tension, the youth, son of Robert G. Clement, a prosperous North Carolina planter, stood in the prisoner's dock for five minutes and heard the clerk of court read in informal old English the solemn charge that he did away with Virginia Virl Pendleton "against the peace and dignity of the state."

"What say you?" asked the clerk at the conclusion of his long recital. "Are you guilty or not guilty?" "Not guilty," answered the prisoner in a shrill, almost falsetto voice. "How will you be tried?" "By God and my country."

"Are you ready to come to trial?" "No, sir."

The ind smiled painfully when the ordeal was over and he was allowed to step down from the dock, where he had been the focus of 2,000 eyes, and taken back to jail.

A colloquy between Judge Shipp, presiding, and Solicitor Hill, resulted in the trial to begin on Thursday at 10 o'clock. Judge Shipp said he set this date with the understanding that he would entertain motions for a continuance. Such motions are almost certain to be made by Clement's counsel.

The spectators who hoped to see Miss Pendleton the co-defendant were disappointed. Her counsel, Colonel Alvin H. Dean, waived the formality of arraignment. Solicitor Hill was inclined not to accept the waiver, but the matter was allowed to drop.

W. J. HARRIS FOR GOVERNOR

Atlanta, April 21.—W. J. Harris, former state senator, and now director of the United States census bureau, is positively going to run for governor of Georgia.

While no definite arrangements on the subject have yet been made, it has been suggested here that his probable campaign managers will be Herbert Clay, son of the late U. S. Senator Clay and Hon. Jesse Mercer, former editor of the Fitzgerald Enterprise and former state game commissioner.

An interesting coincidence in the probable selection of Mr. Clay to handle the campaign lies in the fact that the late Senator Clay, before his death, advised that Harris would one day be governor of his state and United States senator.
