Funston Takes Army to Mexico---Americans In Danger---More U.S. Marines Fall In Ba

Washington, April 23.—United States troops moved tonight to reenforce the American navy at Vera Cruz. Rioting and attacks on Americans have been reported in Washington from many points in interior Mexico today.

The embargo on arms into Mexico was formally restored, and troops were ordered to the Mexican border primarily to relieve uneasiness among border residents, but also as a precaution against any hostile military operations along the international line.

Secretary Garrison announced that a brigade of infantry and some artillery under Brigadier General Frederick Funsion had been ordered to embark on the four army transports at Galveston for Vera Cruz to support the epeditionary forces of marines and blue jackets there.

The chance that General Maas, the Mexican federal general, might make a return attack on Vera Cruz with reenforcements and the possible necessity of a forward movement toward Mexico City to protect fleeing Americans and the Vera Cruz rail and were the underlying reason for the military movement.

The restorttion of the embargo on arms was officially announced after the pronouncement of General Carranza, the constitutionalist chief, that he regarded the seizure of Vera Cruz as a violation of Mexican sovereignty had been considered by the administration.

Mexican rebels here protested that Carranza's real attitude was friendly, the American government decided to take no chances and abruptly stopped the shipment of all arms into Mexico.



EMBARGO GOES BACK ON ARMS

(By Associated Press)

Washington, April 23.—Secretary Duniels today issued orders forming a special service squadron for service on the East coast of Mexico. Rear Admiral Cameron McR. Winness has been selected to command and will hoist his flag on the New York, which will leave Sunday or Monday to join the fleet now in Mexican waters.
