New York Cotton

The cotton market was more or less irregular and unsettled during the day's trading, with the close barely steady, net unchanged to 2 points lower. May was relatively easy under scattering liquidation and showed the maximum loss, although maintaining a premium of about 9 points over the July at the close. The talk around the ring reflected continued nervousness with reference to the near month situation. Liverpool was credited with trading both ways here today and it was reported that some of the recent heavy buyers of May and July were sellers on the afternoon.

New Orleans Cotton

New Orleans, La., April 24.—Cotton moved nervously today, at the high standing 3 to 11 points over yesterday's close and 2 to 5 points under at the lowest. The close was 2 points up to 7 point down, compared with the last price of yesterday.

While weather conditions were better than expected, they were not favorable enough to cause pronounced selling.
