Olin Sanders returned yesterday afternoon from Greenville where he went for the purpose of securing Bob Johnson, a negro wanted in Anderson county on a charge of violating a contract. Johnson was one of a party of three wanted here. The other two negroes were caught in Greenville some days ago but at that time Johnson could not be located. He is now an honored guest in Sheriff Ashley's hotel.

New Occupation For the Magistrate. Magistrate Broadwell had a strenuous day yesterday. He possibly broke all records for the number of warrants issued in one day and then on top of that he had a will harder to set out for him, he had to marry a couple. The groom came from Spartanburg, the groom being John G. Bishop while the bride is Miss Sue Estelle Parris of the Spartan city. Mr. Bishop has been spending some time in Anderson connected with the force of telephone workmen. The magistrate made a good job of the affair and claimed afterwards that he enjoyed the experience.
Anderson Has Almost 800 Autos. Investigation at the office of Jas. N. Pearman, clerk of court, reveals the fact that Anderson now has almost 800 automobiles, there being 721 machines registered in the county, aside from some few in the hands of dealers not yet registered. Mr. Pearman says that his records show 31 cars registered within the last 30 days. This demonstrates very conclusively that Anderson is prosperous and that Anderson's people are living on ease street.
Dr. Frazer Will Speak in Columbia. Rev. Dr. W. H. Frazer, pastor of the First Presbyterian church of Anderson, has accepted the invitation to deliver the Sacramental sermon at the College for Women in Columbia during the commencement exercises this year.
