NEW CITY FATHER SELECTED JUNE 16

Death of Office Administrator To New Aldermen From Ward 4 Last Night

Anderson city council met in the council chambers last night, the first meeting since the death of the late city father, Mayor Holman. The meeting was a routine one and the business transacted was of little interest. The regular meeting was held last night but it was determined to postpone the affair until last night on account of the fact that yesterday was the day for selecting the new aldermen from ward four.

The council canvassed the vote in yesterday's election, declaring Keya G. Gilmer to be the alderman from ward four and Mr. Holman performed this duty. Following this, Mr. Gilmer was sworn in and took the oath of office and was elected to the office of mayor.

The mayor announced that Mr. Gilmer would assume positions on the committee of which Mr. Fournes, the former alderman, was a member. This will include the very important position of chairman of the fire committee and also the civil improvement committee.

CITY EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE HELD MEETING

NEW CITY FATHER SELECTED JUNE 16

Mayor of Anderson and Aldermen Will Be Voted On Here On That Date

A meeting of the Anderson city Democratic executive committee took place yesterday morning in the office of Hood & Sullivan, at which time the date for the first municipal election was held. It was held on June 16, 1914. At the meeting yesterday afternoon the executive committee were present, these being: G. C. Sullivan, Lee G. Holleman, W. H. Sherer, B. P. Wilson, G. F. Browne and J. D. East.

The organization was effected by the selection of G. Cullen Sullivan as chairman and W. H. Sherer as secretary of the committee. The rules adopted regarding the filing of pledges say that all candidates must file their pledges by June 2 and it is the intention of every voter must have his name on the club roll at least five days before the election in order to secure the right of suffrage. Candidates for mayor will be assessed \$10 and those for alderman \$5.00 each according to the ruling of the committee yesterday.

City Has Been Divided Into Districts and Workers Will Canvass House to House

Dividing the city into four districts, known as the southeastern, southwestern, northeastern and northwestern and appointing four acting committees composed of ladies and gentlemen members respectively of the different chapters of the Daughters of the Confederacy and the chamber of commerce; the housing committee of the chamber of commerce having in charge the securing of from 600 to 800 beds for Confederate veterans, got down to real business at the joint meeting held yesterday at the chamber of commerce, and attended by all the members of the four committees. The committee feels sure that the people of Anderson will take care of the veterans, and see that they are entertained and they anticipate little trouble in securing homes for the veterans during their two days short stay here.

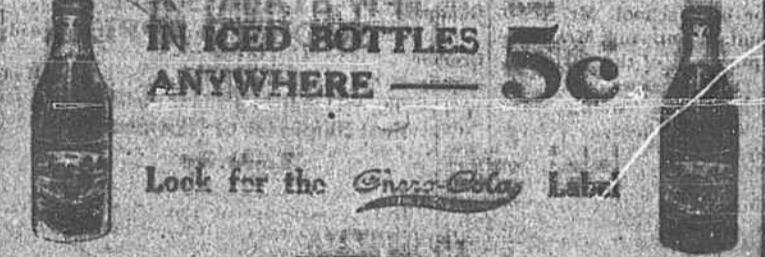

ANDERSON LEADS STATE IN GROWTH

Greater Percentage of Increase Since Census Than Any Other Town in South Carolina

Anderson is now leading the State in percentage of increase in population since the last official census, according to figures coming from Washington yesterday. There has been an increase of population in this city since 1910 of 47.73 percent, the last three years, according to the statistics in the census bureau. This is a percentage of 19.76 per cent, and far ahead of any other city in the State.
