WILL HALL SHOT AND INSTANTLY KILLED

ROW OCCURRED IN FRETWELL'S ADDITION

PISTOL WAS USED

Man and Woman Both Implicated in Killing of Negro Last Night at About 9:30

Will Hall, better-known as "Monk" Hall, a negro porter at a local club, was shot and killed last night at 9:30 o'clock on Peoples Row in Fretwell Addition, a negro settlement in Anderson. The negro was shot through the heart with a 38-calibre pistol and died instantly.

Details of the shooting were hard to obtain last night. The negroes living on Peoples Row seemed to know but little about the dead man. His home was on East End and many of the negroes in the Addition claimed that they knew nothing of him. Shortly after 9 o'clock last night one of the patrolmen heard three pistol shots in rapid succession and he and two other policemen set out for the direction from which the shots came. When they reached Peoples Row they found a woman who said that she knew about where the shot came from and after some search the officers found the negro's body. He was dead and indications were that he had died almost instantly after he was shot. He was partially against a barbed wire fence and an open knife was on the ground beside him. However, his hat was at least 30 yards away and this seems to indicate that he may have run for that distance before he struck the fence and collapsed. He struck a post when he ran into the fence and cut his nose and face but there seemed to be but one pistol wound on his body. This was directly over the heart and the bullet evidently penetrated the heart.

The shooting occurred in a vacant lot between two houses and a negro man living in the house nearest to the scene said last night that he was in the door when he heard the shot and that he saw a man and a woman running away from the spot where the shot was fired. For some time no more information could be gained and the police began to look for some witnesses in the case. They finally located Lizzie Williams, Nellie Williams and Nellie Frazier and looked them in the county jail. Later in the night it was said that these women had confessed they knew something of the murder and had put the officers on the trail of the man who did the shooting. Coroner Hardin was summoned last night at 10 o'clock and he had Dr. Jenkins, a negro doctor, to make an examination of the body. Following that the coroner instructed the dead man's relatives to carry the body to the home and it was announced that an inquest would be held this morning at 8 o'clock.

FIRST PLATFORM IS MADE PUBLIC

Dr. W. F. Ashmore, Candidate For Mayor, Tells His Views On Way City Should Be Run

Dr. W. F. Ashmore one of the candidates for mayor of Anderson, yesterday made public his platform. In which he gives his views and opinions on a number of public questions. The following is what Dr. Ashmore has to say: "I am not in favor of the mayor and council giving a contract beyond their term of office, unless ratified by the people. "I am in favor of running the city on conservative, business principles and if it is impossible to do so I am in favor of cutting down the expenses of the city wherever it is possible to do so. "I am in favor of the best sanitation possible, and that a fund should be set aside for this purpose. I do not mean by this that this fund should be spent on sewer, but for such other purposes that the board of health sees fit. "I am not in favor of the city accepting sewer put in by private parties until it is passed upon by a majority of the board of health and city engineer and recommended by them. "I feel that the granting of the franchise to the Southern Public Utilities company was premature and should have been left to the administration of 1910-10, and that the citizens of Anderson should have voted on it before it was granted; and further, I believe that the terms of the contract is unfair, and will work a hardship on the people and I feel that a 40-year contract is too long and further, before I would have agreed to any such contract, I would have advocated municipal ownership of water and lights. "Corporations are a necessity to any city and I believe in giving them a square deal, and they should be controlled with a legitimate profit. "And it is the duty of the voters of the city to elect men who stand up for the rights of the people and not the classes. "As to the white way, you will hear from me in due time."

THE FARMERS' SOCIETY HALL. Historic Building at Pendleton Where Calhoun and Other Great Men Discussed Crops.

PENDLETON CENTENNIAL

Outlining extensive plans for the Hundredth Anniversary of the founding of the organization, the meeting of the Pendleton Farmers Society held yesterday at Pendleton, proved to be one of the best attended in the recent history of the association. By October of next year, just one hundred years shall have elapsed since the Pendleton Farmers Society was organized at Pendleton Court House, District of Pendleton. At the time the only other agricultural society existing in the United States was the Philadelphia Society for the Promotion of Agriculture. Several years ago the Philadelphia organization ceased existence, and therefore the Pendleton organization is the oldest agricultural society in continuous existence in the United States. And it is therefore fitting that the members attending the meeting yesterday, decided that it would be wise to celebrate the Centennial next year. An elaborate celebration will be held.

CHAMBERS OF COMMERCE NOT GUILTY OF ASSAULTING PERSON OF NEGRO

The case of W. W. Adams, George Smith and J. M. Blackwell, charged with assault and battery with intent to kill upon the person of a negro was heard in the court of general sessions for Anderson county yesterday, and a verdict of not guilty was returned by the jury yesterday afternoon. The case attracted the attention of the court throughout the morning as it lasted until well in the afternoon before going to the jury.

WHITE MEN ACQUITTED OF A SERIOUS CHARGE

This was one of the most interesting cases to be called at this term of court. Adams is a respectable living near Starr and the negro alleged that Adams and the other two white men grew angry with him because he would not give testimony they desired in the famous Huff case at Asheville, N. C. and that they set upon him and banged him by his thumbs, inflicting serious bodily injury. It was alleged that the white men wanted to get a reward offered for the capture of Huff, who slew a policeman in that city, and they believed the negro they sought knew something of the case.

COURT IS NOW ENGAGED IN TRIAL OF OSCAR LEWIS, CHARGED WITH SELLING WHISKEY

Following the completion of that case the court took up the trial of Oscar Lewis, a young white man of Belton, charged with selling whiskey. Considerable interest was manifested in this trial and possibly the fact that the defendant was a young man founded up by Sheriff Ashby's detectives.

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RAISING FUNDS FOR GREAT CONVENTION

ANDERSON ELKS WILL SPEND ALMOST \$1,000

WILL FINISH HOME

Local Lodge of B. P. O. E. Plans To Spend Large Amount When Elks Meet Here

The finance committee of the Anderson lodge of Elks has reported that a splendid start has been made on securing funds sufficient to take care of the State Association of Elks, which meets here June 17-18 and that there will be no lack of hospitality offered to the visitors. The local committee has reported that they will be able to secure almost \$1,000 with which to take care of the convention.

The South Carolina Association is composed of the 11 Elk lodges in this state and every lodge will send large delegations to Anderson next month. All told there will be at least 600 Elks in Anderson for the two days and many believe that an even larger number will be here.

The handsome new home of Anderson Elks, located on the corner of Sharp and McDuffie streets is being rapidly completed. W. L. Driscay, the contractor, said yesterday that in all probability the home would be finished about June 10 although it will be ready before that if possible. The new home will be one of the most complete in the state, with all modern conveniences and it will be a credit to Anderson and to Anderson Elks. The furniture for the new place has already been ordered and it will begin to arrive here within the next few days.

L. H. Carr, district deputy and grand exalted ruler for South Carolina was in Anderson yesterday to see Capt. R. J. Banner, exalted ruler of the Anderson lodge, to the effect that the Anderson convention promises to be the biggest ever held in the state, and to be the most successful.

With a delegation of about 150 from Columbia, an equal number from Charleston and Greenville, over 50 from Spartanburg and large delegations from Newberry, Sumter, Orangeburg, Gaffney, Florence and other cities in the state, it is easy to believe that over 600 Elks will be here.

One of the principle features of the meeting here will be the parade which will take place some time during the two days of the convention. The exact day has not been decided yet but this will be accompanied with music. The various lodges of the state will also send delegations in the official purple and white uniforms and the parade will make an impression upon Anderson people.

Another decided feature of the convention will be the first public appearance of the drum and bugle corps of the Columbia lodge. Attired in gay uniforms, and with music and color, they will make the parade and lodges in the state sit up and take notice. This is the first to be organized in this state.

A number of Anderson business houses are planning to decorate for the occasion using the purple and white of the order, and the city will be alive with "Hello Bills" and their well-wishers for the two days in June.
