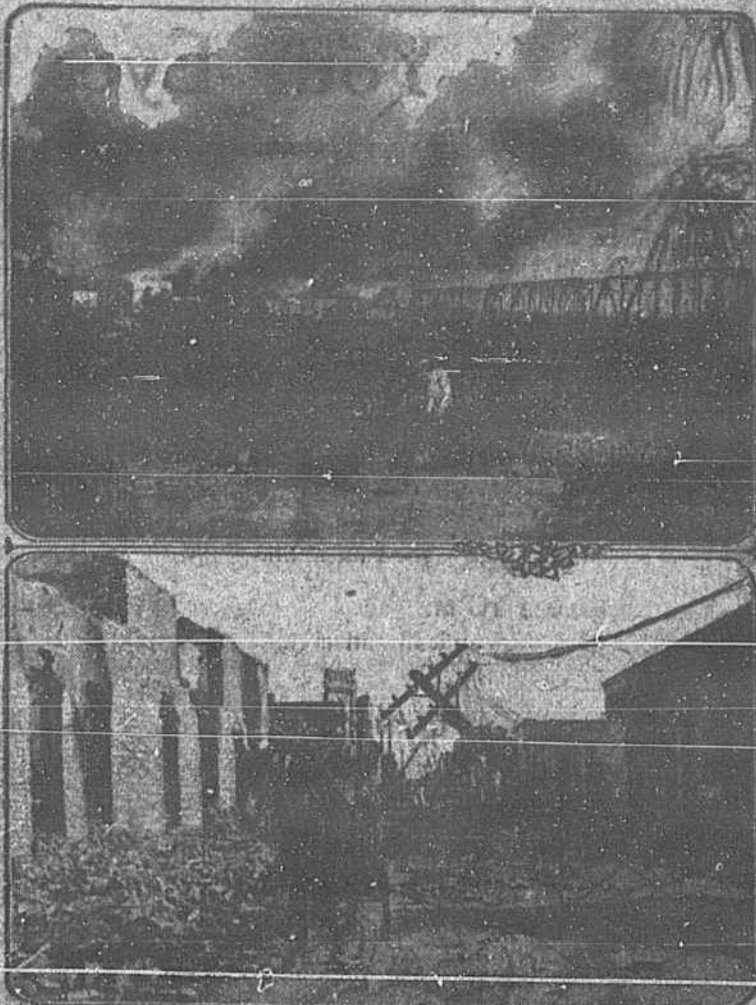


Photos From War Torn Mexico; City Destroyed by Federals

THE destruction of the Mexican city of Nuevo Laredo, opposite Laredo, Texas, has proved one of the most costly incidents of the disturbances in the southern republic. The federals, attacked by the rebels, retreated from the city, after burning the houses and setting fire to the buildings. Flames swept through the streets unchecked and destroyed all stores, dwellings and churches. The illustration shows the city burning as viewed from the United States banks of the Rio Grande and also the main street after the conflagration had burned itself out.

JAPANESE VOLCANOS

Tokio, May 14. The Sakura-jima volcano, whose eruption in January caused great devastation, is likely to show still further activity according to Dr. Thomas A. Jaggar, professor of geology at the Massachusetts State Institute of Technology and director of the Hawaiian Volcano Observatory. Dr. Jaggar, who has just ascended Sakura-jima, made the following statement to the Associated Press regarding his observations.

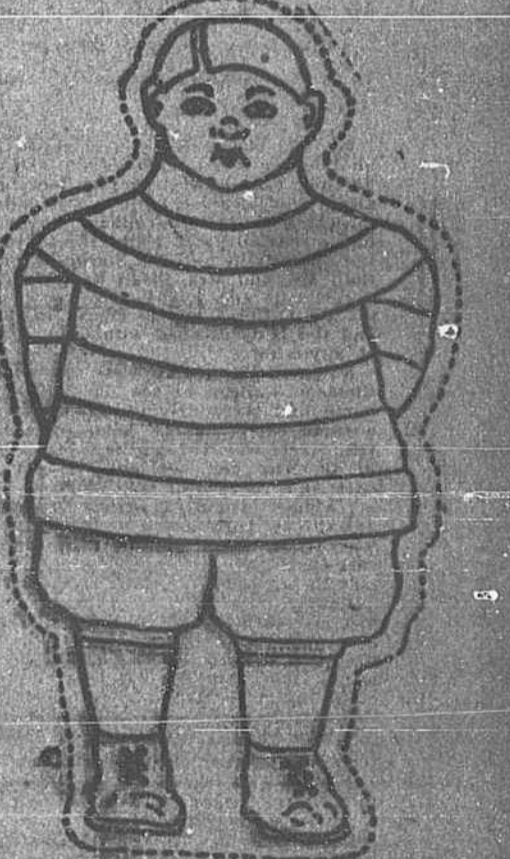
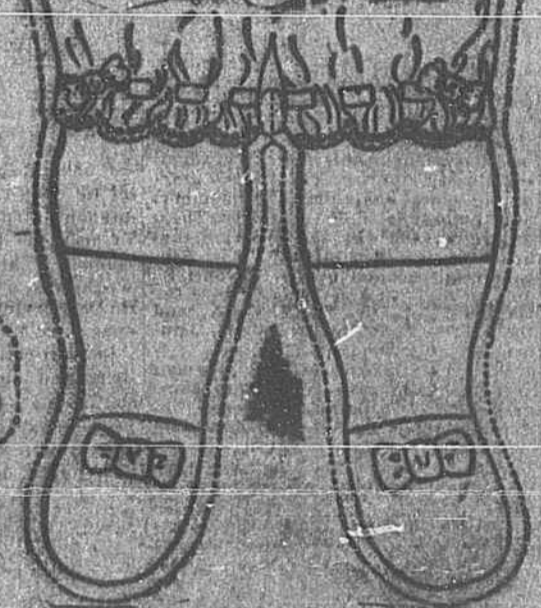
"During the course of the eruption, the average level in Kaguruma Bay has risen two feet. In the short space of 1,000 years remarkable changes may take place in the topography of the gulf of Kaguruma. So prepared the asymmetry of its volcanic cone, Sakura-jima is likely to erupt once or twice on the northern side in the future and if the lava oriented were to send the amount thrown out this year it would easily cut off the northern part of the gulf, thus forming a lake. It was about 10:30 when the boat group off Sakura-jima was sighted. The boat was carrying a party from the Chesoo, who thought it was a mass of lava covered with pumice stones and white ash. The Chesoo located the island at latitude 33° 21' degrees and 131° 11' west. When the boat approached the island it was about 100 feet high.
