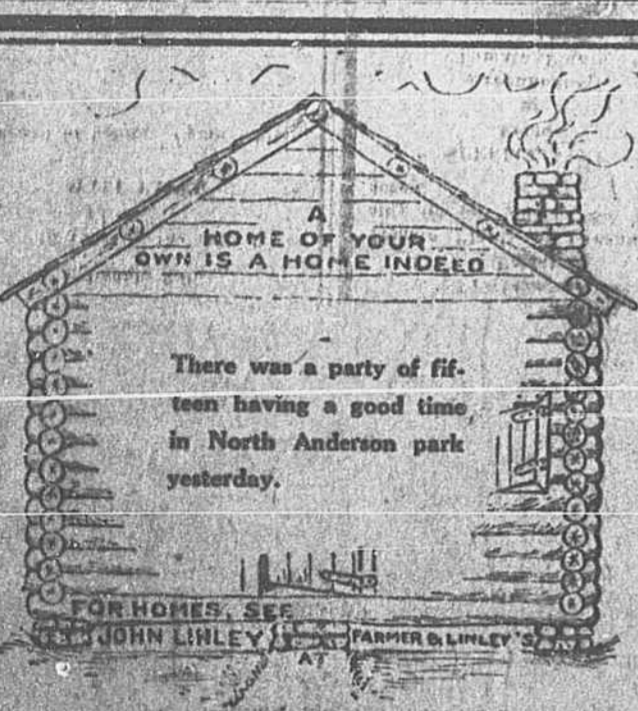

ANDERSON COMPETES WITH FIVE COUNTIES FARMERS HAVE A CHANCE AT BIG PRIZES \$250 IN CASH PRIZES

Interest Is Awakened In All Of The Piedmont Section Over Prize Oats Offer. The farmers of Anderson county and those of Oconee, Pickens, Greenwood, Newberry and Abbeville counties as well as evincing a lively interest in the oat contest which is to be brought to a close in Anderson on the third Tuesday in July...

For the Best Bushel—First best bushel of oats \$100. Second best bushel oats 50. Third best bushel oats 40. Fourth best bushel oats 30. Fifth best bushel oats 20. Sixth best bushel oats 10. Conditions Governing Contest: 1. Every contestant must use Anderson Phosphate and Oil Co. Fertilizers. 2. Every contestant must state the variety of oats, date of sowing, preparation of soil, amount Fertilizer used and the date of harvest. 3. Every contestant must deposit with Furman Smith a bushel, as an entrance fee to this contest on or before noon on the third Tuesday in July, 1914...

Increase In Acreage. In discussing the contest Mr. Smith said: "We have endeavored to secure from reliable sources all the advice possible as to the acreage sown to oats in Anderson county this season, and the replies indicate conservatively that the increase is fully fifty per cent over that of any previous year. We are not able to give definite advice as to the acreage sown in Abbeville, Newberry, Pickens or Oconee counties, but from reports believe that Greenwood will show a marked increase in acreage sown to oats. We believe that the planters who have sown liberally will have occasion to congratulate themselves next season, as it is evident now that good prices will prevail for especially the early yields. We hope that our planters who have not heretofore sown as liberal an acreage as they possibly can of oats every season will profit by the experience of the neighbor planter who does."
