New York, May 16.—The Asiatic Institute of this city has made public the first of a series of reports from W. W. Rockhill, former United States minister to China, and more recently ambassador to Russia, later to Turkey, on the situation in Mongolia, In behalf of the Asiatic Institution Mr. Rockhill recently penetrated the regions where once powerful Mongol races have been trying to maintain its independence from the Republic of China.
