Information of Greatest Value To South Carolina History.

STATE'S HISTORY **EPITOMIZED**  List of Governors and Lieutenant Governors From Colonial Times to Date.

This is the most complete list of the governors of South Carolina ever pub-lished, and is the first list ever published, so far as I know, of the lieu-tenant governors. It is furthermore distinctive in that I do not ask anyone to take it on faith, the citation of the authority for every statement is explicity given. For this reason I hope it may be of value to historical students. The list taken from Mc-Crady's history is substantially correct though there are some minor in-accuracies, as he himself indicates at another place. Lack of time prevented my going to the sources for these 25 governors, but, for the convenience of readers, I insert them.
In saying a governor before the civil

war was elected (on December 10, e. g.,) I name the day on which he was declared elected, though occasionally the voting may have been a day or so

This list of 25 proprietary governors is taken from the appendix of Mc-Crady's South Carolina under the proprietary government, 1670-1719. It is inserted here for the convenience of those who may wish to preserve in one place a complete list. Those after James Moore, Dec. 21, 1718, are compiled by me from the records in the secretary of state's office and in the legislative library. The authorities beginning with 1842 are in the latter, with the exception, which is noted at the proper place.





## War Is Declared

This is a facsimile, exact size, of the smallest newspaper extra ever issued It is the South Carolinian, published in Columbia, Dev. 20, 1860, announcing that the secession convention had passed the ordinance which was the cause of war. Rev. Dr. W. P. Jacobs, who reported the secession convention for the newspapers, is yet living at Clinton, one of the few survivors of that stirring scene.


