Gen. Walker Not To Be Present.
 General regret is felt and expressed all over Anderson because of the fact that Gen. Irvine C. Walker of Summerville cannot be present for the days of the reunion. There is no more distinguished veteran in the State than Gen. Walker and many had hoped that he would be here. The Chamber of Commerce wired him on yesterday morning, asking that he try and come and that much disappointment was occasioned last night, when a telegram was received from Gen. Walker in which he said that it was a regret of his life that he could not be present and that he was deeply grieved because he could not accept the flattering invitation.

Anderson People Fond of Ice Tea.
 Evidently Anderson people are very fond of ice tea and if that is not the case they don't know what they want to buy. Walter H. Keese, the jeweler, advertised in the Intelligencer several days ago and one or two more papers that he would offer for sale on Monday, 100 dozen ice tea spoons at a remarkably low rate. Yesterday Mr. Keese started the sale at 9 o'clock and long before night he had sold the entire shipment of the spoons and had orders he could not fill. There were 24 mail orders for the spoons, aside from the purchasers coming in person. Mr. Keese says that this should be sufficient to convince anyone that it does pay to advertise.

Wonderful Work Done in School.
 Wonderful work has been done by the negro schools of Anderson during the past year and if there is any one skeptical concerning this matter the proof is easy to be had. An inspection of the Reed street public school (colored), yesterday afternoon showed that the industrial department of that school did well. The exhibits of plain and fancy sewing, pillow-making, quilt-making, etc., were all extremely good and the broom factory for the boys of the school was a revelation. There are few people acquainted with the splendid work that the school is doing, and it would pay many of the white people to take a trip to this school and see what is being done. Interesting closing exercises were held in this school yesterday afternoon.

Windows Are Pretty Sight.
 Anderson merchants have taken advantage of the Confederate reunion to stage some splendid advertisements. The windows of the various stores are aglow with things dealing with the Confederate and some unique and interesting sights are to be seen in several of the show windows. Worthy of special mention is the window of Evans' Pharmacy No. 1, and the Olympia Ice Cream parlor has also arranged a most attractive display for the week.

Gaffney Lodge "Chinese Delegates"
 At a recent meeting of the Gaffney Lodge No. 1305 B. P. O. Elks an election was held to decide upon delegates to represent the Gaffney lodge at the State convention of the order, which is to take place this year in Anderson, June 17 and 18. The Gaffney Lodge elected the following delegates: Ed. H. DeCamp, C. C. Robinson, W. George Hays, William Bell, and Watson Bell. Aside from these five delegates the Gaffney Lodge will send probably 25 or 30 other representatives of the "Hello Bill" organization to take part in the deliberations of the State association. Gaffney will come fully attired in their white and purple uniforms.

Choir Will Meet Tonight.
 Notice has been issued by those who are to compose the choir for the Veterans' Concert that a rehearsal will be held tonight at 6 o'clock at Beuna Vista Park and every member is urged to be present as this will be the final rehearsal and all plans for the rendition of the music will be decided tonight.

Three Theatres To Open Earlier.
 There will be no lack of amusement during the two days of the Confederate reunion if the three motion picture shows of the city can prevent it. The shows are all advertising that they will open at 1:30 in the afternoon on both Wednesday and Thursday and a continuous performance will be given from that time until midnight. Splendid war pictures have been secured by all the shows and thrilling scenes will be witnessed by hundreds of veterans.

War Relics Are Now Here.
 The shipment of relics from Belton which was sent to Anderson for the reunion by Alden Smith, arrived in the city yesterday and this morning they will be carefully unpacked and placed in the windows of the Moore-Wilson Company. This is by far the most interesting collection of arms ever seen in Anderson and the people of the city will all want the place to show them while they are here.

"Homelinks" Are Arriving Daily.
 Every train coming into Anderson yesterday brought a number of "homelinks" and almost all the traveling men making Anderson their headquarters have arranged to spend Wednesday and Thursday here. They are here for the reunion and each and every one of them will do everything possible to make the reunion a success and to make every citizen feel, before he leaves the city, that Anderson is "His Town" as well as ours.

An Uprising of All the Negroes.

It was found upon investigation that the Anderson negro baseball team and the Greenville team were scheduled for a set-to and the swarm arising on Main street was nothing more nor less than the "rooters" accompanying the team to Greenville.

Kossuth's Sex Is Dead.
 Budapest, May 25.—Francis Kossuth, son of the great Hungarian patriot, died here today at the age of 73. He had been an invalid for many months. Immediately after Kossuth's death his widow attempted to commit suicide by taking poison. Her condition is considered serious.
