Walter Williams, a negro, was arraigned in Magistrate Broadwell's court yesterday on a charge of vagrancy. It is believed that Williams may be more willing to work when he serves the days.

Learned Name of Automobile Thief.

A dispatch from Greenville yesterday said that Greenville county officials had succeeded in learning the name of the man now in jail at that place charged with stealing Mrs. Beale's automobile at Calhoun Falls and that of John M. Steele in Greenville. The jailer worked a ruse by which he secured from a "trustworthy" prisoner a letter that the man had written to his mother in Georgia and was thus able to find out his real name. He said here that his name was Fuller and in Greenville he said that it was Smith, both of which were of course fictitious. The Greenville authorities refuse to divulge his actual name.

Lad of Fifteen

During the War. Among the veterans in the city today is A. M. Whaley, treasurer of Humphreys Camp, 318, Edisto Island, S. C., who was 15 years of age when he entered the army. He was in Capt. Brock's Anderson company and is a personal friend of Mr. Brock. He is also an uncle of Porter A. Whaley. It is Mr. Whaley's first trip to Anderson since 1895, when he attended a church meeting here and he expressed himself as being astonished at the marvelous growth of the city. After the war he refuged at Anderson then prospected in Texas, later returning to his boyhood home at Edisto Island, where for 50 years he has been a large sea island cotton planter and merchant.

Col. Taylor May Ask State Office.

A report was going the rounds in Anderson yesterday to the effect that Col. D. A. Taylor of Sandy Springs has definitely decided to make the race for Commissioner of Agriculture of South Carolina and it is believed that the Sandy Springs man will make it hot for Col. E. J. Watson. There is no better known man in this section of the state than "Uncle Dave" and he possesses all the qualifications necessary for filling the office in a capable manner. He has many friends in all sections of South Carolina and all these will take off their coats and go to work for him as soon as he gives the word. No definite announcement has been made by Col. Taylor as yet, but it is believed that he will soon announce his candidacy.

Mr. Ashley Suffered A Painful Injury.

People in all sections of Anderson county will regret to learn that Hon. J. W. Ashley met with a painful injury yesterday morning when he fell at his home near Honea Path.
