VERY SHORT SESSION OF THE CITY COUNCIL

ROUTINE MATTERS OCCUPIED ATTENTION

REUNION DEFICIT

Council Established New Record Last Night Remaining in Session Less Than An Hour

The Anderson city council fairly out-did itself last night in the way of breaking all records when it held a regular meeting and adjourned in less than one hour's time. This is an unparalleled performance on the part of council and occasioned surprise among those familiar with the weighty deliberations of that body. The most important action taken by council last night was that of voting an appropriation of \$200 to help clear off the indebtedness of the Veterans' reunion and this together with routine affairs, constituted the business of the evening. Mayor Hollmann called the meeting to order at 8:30 o'clock and all aldermen were found to be present except one. The owners of the Bellevue hotel requested that the sum of \$25 be refunded them on account of reduction in rates and as the petition was approved by the board of assessors this refund was granted. Gen. M. L. Bonham and Gen. C. A. Reed appeared and requested that council give financial assistance in paying of the debts incurred by the reunion committee, explaining that the total cost of the reunion amounted to \$2500. It was unanimously voted to comply with the request. H. P. Smith, who was convicted before Recorder Erlerson on a charge of selling liquor, whose appeal to the circuit court was denied a few days ago by Judge Prince appeared and asked that council set aside the verdict against him. The matter was referred to the recorder and the city attorney with power to act. C. J. B. DeCamp was present in the interests of the application from the C. & W. C. railroad for better drainage protection along the site of the new terminals station. The city attorney was asked to give his opinion concerning the legality of the application and said that if the city's drainage system is not sufficient that the city would be liable, but on the other hand if the present system is sufficient no action could be forced upon council. The matter was discussed at length. An opinion was given from the city street superintendent to the effect that a storm sewer for this part of Main street would cost about \$375. It was finally voted that a proposition be made to the railway to the effect that the city would bear as much as 75% of the expense of the new drain if the railroad would bear the remainder, the total being about \$2,500 for the continuation down Market street. The College Heights Land Company presented a petition asking that they be allowed to construct about 1,000 feet of sewerage, approximately one-third of which will be in the city limits. Permission was granted. Alderman Carter requested that a number of affairs be attended to in his ward. He asked that a light be placed on Mills street, explaining that the people in his ward were receiving no benefit from the new white way and he felt that his people were entitled to consideration. The matter was referred to the water and light committee. He also wants a street opened from F street to I street and explained that this would result in great benefit to a number of the people in his ward. A committee was appointed, consisting of Aldermen Carter and Spearman, to look into this matter and they were given power to act. Mr. Carter also secured permission of the body to have a place repaired in front of the Langley residence. Alderman Spearman presented a petition from the Red Cross Drug store, asking that they be allowed to install a gasoline tank in front of their place of business. This was the cause of much discussion. It being pointed out that similar requests had been refused prior to this by the city and this request was finally refused. Alderman Gilmer moved that 10 members of the Anderson Fire department be sent to the Firemen's Tournament which meets in Florence this month and that council defray the actual expenses of the trip. An amendment was added by Alderman McCurtain for the expense appropriation not to exceed \$150 and the motion prevailed. It was stated that an ordinance now exists which prohibits merchants from placing their wares upon the sidewalk for display and the chief of police was notified to give warning to all the merchants today and to see to the enforcement of this law. All bills were read and approved and council was adjourned shortly before 9:30 o'clock. A Card of Thanks.
