**Anderson Will Send President.**  
No meeting has yet been held in Anderson for the purpose of electing a president of Anderson's baseball association and this should be done at once. However, if the fans do not select a president of the league association here before next Monday some other representatives will go from Anderson to look after their interests at the meeting of the league officials, which is to take place in the Imperial hotel at Greenville at 3 o'clock. At this meeting every club in the league will have its president in attendance to make suggestions about the schedule, which is to be adopted on that day. It is probable that Porter A. Whaley and F. M. Burnett will both go from Anderson.

**Chance For An Anderson Boy.**  
If there is any boy in Anderson who has an education and yet without funds with which to secure it he has a chance just the same. It has been announced that the examination for the scholarship to the Citadel from Anderson county will be held on Friday, August 14 at the county court house. This is a splendid chance for some young man. The Citadel is known to be one of the best institutions of its kind in the country and the scholarship now being offered is worth \$300 per year. There will probably be several to stand the examination.

An approaching social event of next week in which Anderson people will be interested is the wedding of Miss Lily Marian Higgins, June 24, at 7:30 o'clock. The ceremony will be performed at the home of the bride's parents, Mr. and Mrs. F. W. Higgins at 1200 Hunt street. Miss Higgins is well known and popular in Anderson county, having taught for the last year at the Hampton school. The groom is a prosperous and progressive farmer of this county, a son of J. W. Wright.

**Mr. McGill To Open New Business.**  
John A. McGill, who has lived in Anderson for a number of years has announced that he will shortly retire from the retail grocery business and open a wholesale concern. Mr. McGill says that he is anticipating a big business when he gets started. He has not yet finally determined upon where his new business will be located but is considering several buildings.

**Jewelers Were Well Represented.**  
South Carolina jewelers were well represented in Anderson during the State Association of Elks. A. W. Biber of Spartanburg and Paul Crosby of Spartanburg took an important part in the activities of the Spartanburg delegation and Herman Spahr of Orangeburg was another jeweler enjoying the day here. **Bride and Groom Visiting Anderson.**

Mr. and Mrs. Holland were married a few days ago at Pelzer, the bride being Miss Lillian Rhodes of that place. Mr. Holland is a courteous and competent employee of the G. S. & A. railway and has many friends in Anderson.

**Many New Cars Being Delivered.**  
With the coming of summer there is much activity lent to the automobile, business and Anderson dealers are having little trouble in disposing of their cars. They are handling as many as they can buy and the demand seems to be increasing. Clarence Brown yesterday purchased a beautiful Mitchell car, seven passenger, with all equipments and several other machines will probably be sold in Anderson today.

**Rain Extended All Over State.**  
Thursday's rain was just exactly what South Carolina people have been praying for weeks. It was a general rain, extending all over the State and it was the kind of rain needed for the growing of crops. Some sections of Anderson county where but little rain had fallen in weeks, were partly benefited by the downpour of Thursday and it will mean thousands of dollars to the farmers of this county alone.

**Mr. Sullivan Was Elected Delegate.**

The South Carolina association has been in session for the last two days at Rock Hill, where every courtesy and entertainment has been afforded. Anderson people will also be interested in learning that J. S. Morse of Abbeville was elected president of the association.

**Picture Machine Has Been Bought.**  
The moving picture machine, which is to be used by the extension department of the Y. M. C. A., has been purchased and it is expected to arrive within the next few days. The machine is of the latest pattern, and is equally as good as any used by the picture shows. It is planned to give free exhibitions at the various mills in Anderson and it is believed that the endeavor will take well with the Anderson mill people.

**Mr. Felton Is In Columbia.**  
J. B. Felton, county superintendent of education, left yesterday for Columbia where he will endeavor to secure more money for Anderson schools. Mr. Felton wants an additional \$2,000 for the weak schools of Anderson county. This county has already received \$1,000 from the fund for aiding the weak schools, but this is not sufficient to help all the weak schools in the county worthy of help. Mr. Felton will hold a conference with J. E. Swearingen, State superintendent of education, in his efforts to get the further financial assistance. The Anderson official is expected to return tonight.

**The board of canvassers at work on the whiskey petition, reported on yesterday that they had examined about 400 of the names on the various petitions. They have been a large number of names from the different sections and they are being compared with the registration board in order to see whether or not the names are equal to voters. The committee in charge of the task is making splendid progress but it will probably be the middle of the week before it can definitely announce the result of the work. This will then be but an indication of what the petitions really show.**

**New Clubs Will Organize Today.**  
Today is the day set by the executive committee for all clubs in Anderson county, not yet organized, to effect an organization. There are several such clubs in the county and there are also several new clubs to be formed. At the last meeting of the county democratic executive committee today was chosen as the date for the voters to assemble and reorganize and in all sections of the county there will be some clubs in session today.

**Comments Heard On Pretty City.**  
Many were the comments made by the visitors in the city for the last two days. They were all immensely pleased with everything they saw and they did not hesitate to express their opinions. One feature attracting much attention was the "white way" which made quite a bit with the visitors, even with those coming from towns where a similar system is already in use.

**Mr. Reed Married At Spartanburg.**  
Mr. H. O. Reed has returned to Anderson from Spartanburg where she went to attend the marriage of her son, Archie Reed. Mr. Reed is a native of Anderson, but is employed in Spartanburg by the Bell Telephone Company. He has many friends here and they will all wish him much happiness.

**Many Leaving For Vacations.**  
If the present exodus continues, Anderson will be well represented at the seashore and in the mountains within the next few weeks. A number of Anderson people have already made their arrangements for vacations, while many are planning to leave within a few days. Hendersonville and other points in North Carolina and Charleston and the Isle of Palms will attract a number of the up country people.

**New Clerk at Chiquola Hotel.**  
E. W. McMurray, who has been night clerk at the Chiquola hotel, has resigned that position and will leave Anderson within a few days for South Georgia. Mr. McMurray is succeeded in the hotel by Mr. Frank Galliard, who has already entered upon his new duties. Anderson people will regret to see Mr. McMurray depart, as he has made a number of friends here.

**CANAL WILL BE USED**  
Steamer Companies are Giving Notice of Intent to Go Via Panama.  
Washington, June 19.—Six established steamship lines already have served notice upon the Panama canal management of their intention to make regular use of the canal. One vessel from the West coast ports of South America will be at the Pacific gates of the canal July 3, seeking to make her way to Liverpool by that route and thus initiating a fortnightly service between Liverpool and the West side of South America.

**An American steamship company now operating four steamers on the Pacific side and six on the Atlantic, is awaiting the opening of the canal to merge all ten into a regular line between San Francisco and New York. Hawaiian sugar, which has already begun to come through the canal barges, being transhipped at either end, will be carried in unbroken cargoes from Honolulu to New York, just as soon as Governor Goethals gives the word that regular steamships may use the waterway.**

**Special Case Held Back.**  
Washington, June 19.—Continued absence of members of the House Judiciary committee from the city has further delayed presentation of the report of the sub-committee which investigated impeachment charges against Federal Judge Emory Speer, of Macon, Ga. The report is now expected to come next week. It is understood that a majority of the investigators hold to the view that sufficient evidence was not presented to warrant an impeachment.

**THE SOUTHERN IS THERE**


**A Hundred Years of Peace Celebrated In Labor.**  
Washington, June 19.—At the Anglo-American Hundred Years Peace Exposition, now open in London, the Southern Railway System has the only exhibit made by an American railway and much attention has been attracted by the handsome display of Southern agricultural, horticultural and mineral products. The exposition will be open until November and will be visited by millions of people who will thus have the advantage of the South not before them.

The exhibit is enclosed by polished balls and pedestals of Tennessee, Alabama and North Carolina marble, set on oak posts connected by brass railing. Beneath the railing are blocks of granite from North Carolina and South Carolina quarries. Show cases at the front corners contain specimens of cotton stalks seven feet high filled with bolls. Other cases and tables contain tobacco, fruits, corn and other grain. The useful minerals found in the South such as iron ore, coal, talc, mica, rutile, zinc, silica, kaolin and other clays, granite, limestone and such other minerals and stones as have an active demand in commerce and art are shown.

There are displayed on the walls, on easels and attached to the railings dozens of agricultural, industrial, scenic and city views of the South, including panoramic views of cities, rivers, industrial and mountain scenery. All the views are large, all are colored and all especially selected to give a good idea of the attractions, resources and development of the southern states.
