HELD A MEETING

Adopting Lease in Accordance with Georgia Laws

P. S. Arkwright of Atlanta, president of the Georgia Railway & Power Company, spent yesterday in Anderson, having come here with other directors of what was formerly the Savannah River Power Company. This concern was absorbed first by the Anderson Water & Power Company and then by the Southern Public Utilities Company. Harry A. Orr, now an official of the latter company, was the president of the Savannah River Power Company.

Yesterday's meeting was solely for the purpose of formally approving of the lease of the Southern Public Utilities Company, in accordance with the laws of the State of Georgia, and was merely a confirmation of the action already taken by the stockholders of the concern. Among the other well known visitors to attend the meeting was J. E. Sirrine of Greenville.

Following the conclusion of the business meeting the Georgia visitors, together with the home officials, paid a visit of inspection to Gregg Shoals. The party of capitalists left the city yesterday afternoon for their homes.

ELECTRIC ALARM IN CASE OF FIRE

Is Said to Be One of the Most Pressing Needs of the City at The Present

Among the visitors here during the state convention of the Elks were a great many business men off on a holiday. They did not have much time to talk but all expressed great surprise at the size and bustle and substantiality of Anderson. Among them were some who had suggestions to offer for the future betterment of this city, and nearly all of them urged that Anderson at once go into the building of paved streets.

But there was one especially useful suggestion, coming from the city electrician of Columbia, Mr. J. Talley Harth. This gentleman was a member of the Columbia Drum corps. He is a splendid musician and has been a member of the orchestra of the Columbia theatre for years. He has also been the city electrician for a number of years. He says that Anderson needs paving, and needs to get the poles off from Main street and the public square. He went into ecstasies over the white way here and declared that it has Columbia beat 40 miles in every direction. He stated that he had never seen anything more beautiful in his life and he is going to try to get Columbia to follow in Anderson's foot steps. He declared that any city that brightens up its main thoroughfare at nights will find it a profitable investment.

Mr. Harth called attention to the greatest present need of Anderson—a fire alarm system. He is well acquainted with Mr. Gamewell, the Camden man who invented the system which has been adopted all over the country and he states that he knows that Mr. Gamewell will do whatever he can for any South Carolina city and that if the city of Anderson will install a system now it can take from five to ten years to pay for it.

A "BLIGHT KILLING"

Physician in Spartanburg Ran Over a "Laborer" On Tie Street Saturday

The Intelligencer last night received from Spartanburg a "query" wishing to know if this paper cared for a story on the killing of a man in that city by an automobile. The machine was driven by Dr. Simon Flexner, who is in Spartanburg, as the head of the Rockefeller Institute and, on behalf of the United States government studying pellagra. Laborer struck by auto."

BATTLE OF BALLOTS IS FOUGHT TUESDAY

ANDERSON'S NEW MAYOR WILL BE SELECTED

RESULT IN DOUBT

Both James M. Payne and J. H. Godfrey Will Poll a Good Vote in Second Primary

One of the topics of discussion on the streets of Anderson Saturday was the election which is to be held Tuesday. On that day the voters will make their choice of a mayor. Political wisecracks say that it will be a fight to the finish.

In last Tuesday's election Dr. W. F. Ashmore and E. E. Elmore were both nosed out of the second race by a narrow margin and this leaves the set-to for next Tuesday between J. H. Godfrey and J. M. Payne, both of whom have strong political machines behind them.

Friends of Mr. Godfrey claim that he will be elected, while friends of Mr. Payne are equally insistent that their man will go into office as he has a lead of over 75 votes. However, the friends of Mr. Godfrey are not dismayed over this lead and will make a strong fight to overcome it.

It has been announced that the same rules governing the first election will apply in this election and the same managers will be asked to serve again. If there be any manager unable to serve for this second election he should notify C. P. Brown or W. H. Shearer of that fact at once.

FOR THE STATE SENATE

Jas. L. Jackson of Iva, is Considering Entering the Race.

Jas. L. Jackson, the well known farmer from Iva, was in the city yesterday and states that he is thinking of offering for the senate. He has definitely made up his mind but will do so this week. Hon. J. A. Hall has not formally announced, but it is believed that he may do so. He was the first last winter to speak of the race, for he felt entitled to make it as he had been in the house for a number of years and had put through a number of bills.

GOOD POSITION FOR C. J. LYON?

That is the Rumor Reaching Anderson--Melvin J. Ashley For Sheriff

It was rumored in Anderson yesterday that Sheriff Chas. J. Lyon of Abbeville, had received an appointment to some federal office and that he would be succeeded as sheriff of Abbeville county by Melvin J. Ashley, at present a member of the legislature from Abbeville county and brother of Sheriff Joe M. H. Ashley of this county.

Mr. Lyon is expected here today on a visit to his sons. Nothing definite could be learned yesterday. Mr. Lyon was an applicant for the position of United States marshal, which was given to Mr. Jas. L. Sims of Orangeburg, and it is understood that Mr. Lyon stands a very good chance to be appointed to the position of marshal of the western district of South Carolina, but it is not known that the bill providing for a new district has been passed.

Sheriff Lyon of Abbeville will Soon Be Getting good dose of Religion.

They are telling a good story on Sheriff Charley Lyon of Abbeville. The sheriff is one of the best known men in the state. He treats everybody on the level and has little trouble with his prisoners. He had to shoot one the other day, a fellow by the name of Blessing—but that is another story.

The amusing story is this. Sheriff Lyon has in prison a number of mountaineers who are accused of being "moonshiners." The sheriff is of that religious persuasion known as "Seceders," or Associate Reformed Presbyterians. But he has been seen frequenting the Baptist church quite a lot of late. When interrogated about it he said, "well you see it is like this. Those moonshiners cramped up there in jail rather appealed to me. I sized them up for men of honor, their sole crime being moonshining, and one of them, 74 years old, old man Watkins told me positively that he

Bristow's preaching so well that I have to take them regularly. And I find that preaching doesn't hurt me, no sir ree doesn't hurt me a little bit."

being circulated that if I am elected mayor I will fill the city hall offices with members of my family. I wish to again deny this. I have one son on the police force, and will not put any other member of my family in any city office, should I be elected. I hope this statement will be final.
