The Anderson baseball team, under the direction of Porter A. Whaley, Pres., of the Anderson club will leave the city this morning at 6:30, for Gaffney, where the opening game of the Piedmont league will be played this afternoon.

A meeting of the baseball fans took place in the rooms of the chamber of commerce yesterday and when it was found that no satisfactory arrangement could be entered into, Mr. Garvin, the latter retired as manager of the Anderson team and it was determined that the club would be put in the hands of F. M. Burnett until a new manager can be signed. It is quite possible that McCall, already a member of the Anderson team, may apply to the association for the position of manager. McCall has already had experience in managing league baseball teams and he is an all-around good man.

Yesterday's meeting was called to order by Porter A. Whaley and Capt. R. J. Ramer was unanimously selected as temporary chairman. Following that, Mr. Whaley was elected president of the Anderson club and the following were selected directors: Capt. William Laughlin, Captain Ralph J. Ramer, William Banks and F. M. Burnett. Mr. Whaley will make the first member of the directorate.

The directors selected yesterday as the new officials of the club are determined that Anderson shall have a good team as any other town in the league may boast of and with the material already in hand, and several more good prospects, the indications are that Anderson will develop a winning streak during the early part of the season.

Following the first three games with Gaffney, the team will come back Sunday and will play one Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday with Greenville. The new officers of the Anderson team are planning a number of features for the first three days at home. The club goes on the road this morning with a good aggregation of ball players and there is every reason to believe that the Anderson team will take at least a part of three from Manager Sta. It is a letter to Mr. Watson commending him for previous praise is given prominent place in the Jeffersonian. In reply to this William J. Harris, also candidate for the gubernatorial chair, has written an open letter which is in part as follows: "Judge N. E. Harris is writing love letters to Tom Watson, the enemy of the Democratic party, while I call to Watson that I would not have his support to be governor of Georgia. Watson is denouncing the Democratic president, the democratic cabinet, the democratic senators from Georgia, the democratic congressman from his district, the democratic executive committee members from his district, in fact he is denouncing everything democratic, but singing the praises of N. E. Harris. Many good men have been defeated because of Tom Watson's support and Judge Harris is welcome to it."

GEORGIA SOLONS ARE IN SESSION

The Usual Tide of Bills To Save The Country Has Been Presented

Atlanta, Ga., June 24.—The Georgia legislature declared itself open and ready for business this morning and got down to work. The house was called to order by Speaker Burwell, a prayer was recited by Bishop Warren Candler, John T. Boffel called the roll and the session was on its way. In the senate the solons got down to business with but slight formality. The calendars of the two houses were cultured already with bills sidetracked last summer, but that didn't hinder the members from pouring in a stream of new ones, all designed to save the state from impending disaster.

Bibb county lawmakers have a bill to legalize the sale of real beer under the laws now applying to the well known "high beer" which has helped to make Georgia famous. "They're selling the real stuff, anyway, so why not let's have it done legally," they said.

The veteran of all bills, one which has bobbed up at every session since the legislature met on Marietta street, is still waiting action of lieutenant-governor. Nobody has any real objection to having a lieutenant-governor but somehow they just can't get a chance to vote on that bill. lvgv-r dsckb-E-toddl . mfwyp mw

The suffragists of the state threaten to turn Atlanta into a miniature London and use real militant methods if they don't get action on the bill giving the vote. The organization has many workers in the field and several of them are pretty enough to make single members—and maybe a married one or so—do anything desired.

There are six new members in the house this year, five taking office through the death of previous members and one taking the place of a member resigned. They are H. A. Beckwith, of Dougherty; A. P. Deadwyler, of Elbert; Blon Williams, of Meriwether; T. B. Carroll of Catawba, G.; Glenn of Whitfield and John D. Clark of McIntosh. The last named was elected only yesterday to succeed the late Representative Atwood. He had no opposition.

Gov. Slaton's message will be read tomorrow. The house, so far, is without a real leader. Just who will make himself the Napoleon of the representatives is yet to be discovered, but it is probable that out of the rank and file some general will arise before the session is well under way.

The equalization bill is likely to bring on the big fight of the year. It passed last session by a bare one vote and its opponents are confident of repealing it this year. The bill prohibiting the shipment of liquor into dry territory is apt to bring on a general prohibition anti-battle before it is settled. The bill was buried in committee last year after a bitter fight but is sure to reach a final vote this session.

The school book question, Representative McCrory's bill to have the state publish school books, is also still on the calendar and to judge from the newspaper controversy of the past winter is likely to be debated with considerable acrimony.

The leading prospect is also to come up with the Atlanta plan to erect a grand concrete plaza over the tracks of several railroads, within the heart of Atlanta. The city is heartily back of the plan and the leaders say the state would profit as much as the city by co-operating in putting the plaza across.

The salary versus the fee system arises again in Representative McMichael's bill to put Solicitor-general on a straight salary. While it would materially reduce the income of solicitors in the larger cities, it might be of advantage in quiet counties where cases are few and fees far between.

The child labor fight is already being vigorously launched by its supporters and a red hot fight is anticipated. The strike now on in an Atlanta cotton mill is expected to play an important figure in the debate.

The first harbinger of the legislature today was John T. Boffel, clerk of the house, who arrived in his usual business apparel and his ever-ready smile to prepare the house for business.

GEORGIA ENDORSED IT

Legislature Expresses Satisfaction in the Present National Government. Atlanta, Ga., June 24.—The present National democratic administration today was endorsed by the Georgia legislature which convened for a fifty day session. The resolution declares that the "fifteen months of unparalleled achievement of the National administration, under the leadership of that brilliant ex-Georgian, Woodrow Wilson, is endorsed and approved; and with pleasure commended to the Democracy of the state and country." Among the important bills introduced was one proposing that the sale of beer in the state of Georgia be legalized and licensed.
