ALL EMPLOYEES SHOULD ENROLL

President J. D. Hammett Offers Assistance to the Employees Of Orr Mills to Get Names On

Jas. D. Hammett, president of the Orr Cotton Mills, has had posted a notice in which he advises the employees that in order to take part in the approaching primary they must enroll their names on the club rolls, and that the names must be in full.

The management of this mill has no desire to take part in politics other than as individual voters, and it certainly has no desire to suggest to anyone as to how, or for whom, he should vote.

BLEASER'S STATEMENT As to Why the Militia Will Not Go In to Camp.

Columbia, June 24.—The following is what Governor Bleaser had to say about the National Guard of the State not being permitted to go to Augusta: "The letter from the war department states as its reasons for withdrawing the invitation for the state militia to participate in the Augusta encampment, and for the further refusal to furnish to the state any further equipment, that:

"In view of the large value of the stores which are missing, and are unaccounted for by the state, \$33,127.70, and a large quantity of obsolete stores in value, \$21,984.10, which have not been returned to the custody of the government, etc. the war department has no recourse but to withhold Federal aid from the organized militia of South Carolina until the provisions of the law cited are complied with."

I do not know who is responsible for these shortages as of course, everybody knew that not a single piece of this equipment, or a single article mentioned by the war department has ever been in the hands of the government, so far as I know. This is a matter which is handled by the Adjutant General's department, and I presume that General Moore can make proper showing and will show that there has been no dishonesty in the matter.
