**THE OLD NEGRO WON A LAW SUIT**

**Alleged That He Didn't Get Enough For Some Land That He Sold**

The jury in the case of Miles against Allgood was given the papers in the case early Wednesday night. Judge Prince told them that if they could not agree just to send for him Thursday morning. It was a hot night, so an agreement was reached about 8:30.

The plaintiff was an old negro, about 100 years old, and he was bringing action against Mr. E. P. Allgood. He claimed that he had not received enough for some land that he had sold. The defendant, Mr. Allgood, had asked for a new trial and this was agreed this morning. The jury was requested to answer several questions, and did so as follows, all of the answers being favorable to the plaintiff:

Q. 1. Was the consideration for the alleged deed grossly inadequate?

Yes. T. J. Bell, foreman.

Q. 2. Was there fraud committed either actual or constructive in the procurement of the alleged deed?

A. Yes, constructive fraud. T. J. Bell, foreman.

Q. 3. Was it the intention of the plaintiff to create the deed?

A. No. T. J. Bell, foreman.

Q. 4. Was the defendant at the time of the transaction a person of strong will and intellect?

A. Yes. T. J. Bell, foreman.

Q. 5. Was the plaintiff at the time of the transaction a person of weak and feeble intellect, old and infirm?

A. Yes. T. J. Bell, foreman.

Q. 6. Was the plaintiff led to believe by the defendant that the land in question was deeply involved in mortgage indebtedness?

A. Yes. T. J. Bell, foreman.

This was the last jury case at this term of court.

**FAST FOOT WORK GOT HIM LIBERTY**

**Man Caught at Blockade Still He Got Away From the Officers**

Sherrif Ashley and three deputies went out to Carter's ferry on the Savannah river early Tuesday morning and captured a still in full view. They had had a tip to where the plant was and it was surrounded by the officers about 1 o'clock in the afternoon. After waiting some hours the still and they waited until time enough for him to get there and they sprung the trap. The operator of the still seemed to get wind of them, and left hurriedly. He was in the act of changing his clothes, the sheriff brought the old clothes along with him when he came to the city. If the sheriff can get that man he will enter him in the Fourth of July races and back him against the world for fast foot work.

Before returning to the city the officers rounded up John Davenport a colored helper around the still. A five gallon keg of black's was found in his house. The negro is known to have been peddling "moonshine" in the city of Anderson. The still was brought to the jail.

**MUST GET OFF THE CORNER**

**Greenville City Council Gets After the Inferurban.**

A resolution protesting against the Greenville, Spartanburg & Anderson railway being allowed to unload passengers at the corner of Main and Washington streets instead of the regular station in the center of the block was introduced in city council last night by Alderman Dacus of Ward 1. Some action to abate this "nuisance" should be taken at once, in the opinion of Alderman Dacus, who explained to the council the delay caused by traffic on that corner by the cars stopping 5 or 10 minutes to allow passengers to unload. This motion was seconded by Alderman Martin and later adopted unanimously.

Mayor Marshall said he could appreciate the situation explained by Alderman Dacus, as he had been made to wait behind several automobiles on the corner just a few days ago because of an interurban car standing at the corner and when the motion had been passed instructed the city clerk to notify the railway management that it would in the future be requested to require trainmen to unload and load passengers at one point.

**LARKIN HUGHES DEAD**

**Automobile Runs off Ten Foot Embankment—Damage Slight.**

Mr. Larkin Hughes, one of the oldest citizens of the county, died at his home five miles south of Pickens, yesterday morning from the infirmities of age. He was in his 90th year. He is survived by his wife and several children by a former marriage.

Mr. Jas. A. Hughes of Ware Shoals, S. C. is his only surviving son. His daughter, Miss Thain Hughes, resides at the family homestead.

A Ford automobile, from Pickens, which was occupied by Mr. Sam Craig and six small children and being driven by a small boy, ran off the abutment of the bridge over the Southern Railroad on the Pickens road near the city, Sunday.

About ten feet down the embankment the car was overturned and the occupants thrown in a cotton patch with only some slight injury to part of them. The car was not very badly damaged.

Dr. C. C. Brown, one of the trustees of Anderson College recently resigned the pastorate of the First Baptist church of Sumter where he had been for 29 years. His congregation last Sunday refused to accept his resignation. The Baptist Courier says:

We learn from the Sumter papers that the First Baptist church of that city refused to accept the resignation of Dr. C. C. Brown which was offered on June the seventh. The resignation came before the church for action on the morning of the hour of worship on Sunday the fourteenth and it was rejected by a large majority vote. A committee was appointed to consult with Dr. Brown but his final decision has not at the time of the writing of this note been announced.

**DEATH OF MR. MASSEY HEAD**

**MAYBERRY GOLFED WAY TO VICTORY**

**Charleston Man Won Title of Carolinas By Effective Putting At Asheville**

Asheville, June 25.—E. F. Mayberry, of Charleston, S. C., today won the title in the annual tournament of the Carolina Golf Association for the championship of North and South Carolina, defeating F. M. Laxton, of Charlotte. Laxton shot on the tee but Mayberry's putting won the match. Mayberry's total was 166 and Laxton's was 169.

At the annual meeting of the association tonight, the cups were presented by Dr. C. S. Jordan, of Asheville, and Charleston, S. C., was chosen as the place for holding the next tournament. Officers of the association were elected as follows:

President, Judge Junius C. Adams, of Asheville; vice-president, W. M. Shand, of Columbia, S. C.; secretary-treasurer, J. Alwyn Hall, of Charleston, S. C.

The action of Judge Adams is the first time in the history of the association that a North Carolinian has been chosen to head the organization.

**WAS BIG VICTORY**

**Villa Captured Zacatecas With a Small Army.**

Zacatecas, June 24.—Delayed over military wires.—General Villa drove from Zacatecas a force greatly exceeding his own, according to official estimates made late today. Between 12,000 and 14,000 Federals defended the city, while the Constitutionalist numbering about 15,000 employ little more than half their number in the attacks of four days, which resulted in victory for the Villa troops; the taking of hundreds of prisoners and munitions, and the demoralized retreat of the remnants of General Barron's army.

The street fighting in Zacatecas was the most severe of the revolution. The Federals fought from one street to another, from house top to house top. Many federals threw away their uniforms and began sniping the invaders. Those who pleaded guilty to the offense were shot after being captured.

The Federals already on the retreat, blew up a mine in the customs house without warning, killing women and children. Many Constitutionalist who had entered the building also were buried in the wreck of the three story structure. How many of the Federals escaped has not been learned. Since the city had been surrounded, the number cannot be very great. A force of four thousand regulars, led by General Pascual Orozco and C. Fuentes arrived Saturday in Zacatecas from Aguas Calientes.

On Sunday the firing started early in the morning and lasted well into the night. Little progress was made by the rebels up to Monday morning, when General Villa arrived from Torreon. The firing that day started early and continued again into the night. The fire was directed against the Hill La Buña, and neighboring hills. The Federals that night protected their positions with a powerful searchlight and prevented a night attack.

On Tuesday the fighting began at 10 a. m. and by 6 p. m., the city had been taken. La Buña fell after street fighting had been in progress for some time. All other Federal positions had been carried during the morning, after-g

**HUGE CROWD ATTENDS**

**Trial of Joseph Ettor, I. W. W. Man Is Attraction.**

Steuensville, O., June 25.—Three thousand persons were in the village of Dillonville today to witness the trial of Joseph Ettor, a leader of the Industrial Workers of the World, charged with attempting to incite striking miners to acts of violence. Court proceedings, however, were tame as Ettor waived a hearing and the warrant was referred to the grand jury.

Hundreds of miners were among those who crowded the streets of the village today, but there was no demonstration. A large force of deputies had been sworn in and an extra guard was placed around the town hall because of alleged threats to dynamite it. Ettor was held in \$1,000 bail.

**Reported That Mill Men Want Him Out of the Senate.**

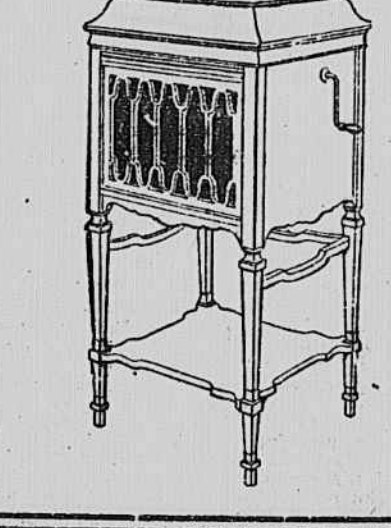
