ANDERSON IS NOW IN LIMELIGHT

Mississippi People are Anxious To Learn About Plan for This County's Farmers' Exchange

That Anderson is by no means an unknown hamlet or village was demonstrated yesterday when the local chamber of commerce received a request from Vicksburg, Miss., that the secretary of the local organization furnish them with a plan for the Farmers Exchange, which has been in operation in this city for some time. The letter was written by T. H. Dickson of Vicksburg, Miss., who is secretary of the Bankers Association of that state and in the course of the letter Mr. Dickson says that he was wonderfully impressed with the address which Mr. Whaley delivered at Vicksburg during the early part of this month. He says that a plan similar to the one tested out in this county by Mr. Whaley, will prove successful in his state and he hopes that he may be able to organize such an undertaking there if Mr. Whaley will lend his assistance. Immediately following the receipt of this letter Mr. Whaley sent the gentleman all the details of the plan, together with photos of exchange day in Anderson and these will appear in a Mississippi magazine within the next few days.

Decorated Trees.

Naco, Ariz., June 27.—The recent capture of the village of Santiago de Esquilantia in the territory of Topic by constitutionalists, resulted in the hanging of fifty Federal soldiers and sympathizers, according to reports which reached Naco today. The executions were said to have been a whim of the colonel in command, quoted as having said the trees in the plaza "looked too bare." The executions were stopped finally through the intercession of a priest.

MOVING PICTURES FOR RESIDENCE SUBURB

ELECTRIC THEATRE WILL CHANGE LOCATION

NORTH ANDERSON

Plans Now Complete For Furnishing People of That Section With Amusement

Due to the fact that no other city in South Carolina possesses a residence section one-half so complete as is North Anderson, the proprietors of the Electric Theatre, on Main street, have announced that they will close this theatre next week and on July 3, an airdome will be established and during July and August, McCullough and Bristow will furnish high class amusement there.

In speaking of the proposed change, one of the amusement men said that the people of Anderson are anxious for open air amusement and it is their purpose to provide it. He said further, that he planned to have one of the nicest places in North Anderson that the city has ever known and that he believes that the people of the city will patronize it. He plans to have the North Anderson show so arranged that all the air going will be admitted and he hopes to make every patron of the show comfortable during the evening.

It is planned to put the new show in a place just adjoining the park and this will doubtless prove to be delightful for the moving picture people and for the people partial to shows of this kind. The airdome will seat several hundred people and popular predictions will go far amiss if the place is not filled every night during the summer months. With the coming of fall, the Electric Theatre will be reopened.
