

AMERICAN KNIGHT DEAD

London, June 30 J-Sir Francis J. Campbell, who was principal of the Royal Normal College and Academy of Music for the Blind from 1872 to 1912, and who was knighted by the king in 1909, died today.

Franklin J. Campbell was born near Winchester, Franklin county, Tennes-see, October 9, 1832. He was educated at the school for the blind in Tennessee and at the University of Tennessee. He studied music at the Bos-ton Conservatory at Leipsic. From 1858 to 1869 he was associated with Dr. S. G. Howe, as resident superintendent and musical director of the
