GAME SATURDAY WILL DRAW BIG ATTENDANCE

MANY FANS WILL SEE GAME ON THE FOURTH

IN THE AFTERNOON

Anderson Will Play at Greenville On Morning of the 4th and Here for Afternoon

The record breaking crowd of the season should turn out next Saturday afternoon, July 4, to witness the game of baseball between the Anderson and Greenville teams of the Piedmont league. Anderson will play before the Fourth of July crowd in Greenville on Saturday morning and then the two teams will come to Anderson for the afternoon game, which is to be played at 4:30 o'clock at Beuna Vista park.

The schedule of the Piedmont league has been so arranged that all four towns in the league will have one game on this day. Spartanburg is to play Gaffney on the Gaffney field Saturday morning and then the two teams will return to Spartanburg for the afternoon game, Anderson and Greenville following the same system.

With a splendid program arranged for the celebration of the day in Anderson, there is no reason why there should not be many visitors to spend the day here Saturday and with hundreds of fans in the city and the prospects of a good game at the park, the financial condition of the local club should be materially bettered.

While it is a little early to make announcements for this game, it is understood that Manager Bull of the Anderson team has practically decided to work Fobinson in the box against Greenville. If Robinson does not pitch the game, Summey will work for the locals and either pitcher can give the Greenville hitters something to worry over. Osteen or Woods will be chosen by Manager Stouch to hurl for the visitors.

Extra cars will be provided by the traction company to carry the crowds from North Anderson and from the city to the baseball park. The program at North Anderson will be completed before it is time for the baseball game to begin and there will be no conflict on this score.

The managers of the two teams have promised the fans that they will see a splendid game Saturday afternoon and it behooves every lover of baseball in Anderson county to come out for the exhibition and thus help bolster up the financial standing of the local team.

DOUBLE HEADER PLAYED TUESDAY

Anderson and Gaffney to Play Off Game Prevented by Rain at Gaffney Last Week

The directors of the Anderson team announce that a doubleheader will be played here either Monday or Tuesday with Gaffney. This is due to the fact that in the last game of the first series at Gaffney between Anderson and Gaffney the game was rained out. It was at first thought that it would be best to play the Gaffney-Anderson doubleheader Monday, but it is explained that Anderson and Greenville play a doubleheader Saturday, July 4th, and it might be too hard on the pitchers. The doubleheader will therefore probably be played Tuesday, according to Fred M. Burnett, secretary of the local baseball association, provided such an arrangement meets with the approval of the management of the Gaffney team.

It is expected that McAllister will reach Greenville in time to pitch today's game against Stouch's aggregation, and if he does not he will certainly report in time to work in the morning game tomorrow.

WATCHING FOR HUNTED NEGRO

Anderson County Officials Anxious for Chance to Capture Pickens Rapist

Sheriff Ashley and Anderson county officials are keeping a close look out for Frank McCullom, a negro, who is wanted in Pickens county to answer charges of murder and rape. On account of the fact that a very minute description has been provided of the negro, the officers will hardly have much difficulty in recognizing him if they ever come in sight of him. Sheriff Roark, of Pickens county, has sent a full and complete description to the Greenville and Anderson officers and the officials of both these counties are constantly on the look out for a strange negro. A reward for his arrest has been offered by the governor in a proclamation in his paper.

The negro was a stranger in that section of the country and had not been working there but a month or two. Farmers are urged to look out for him, as he will probably attempt to secure a job on some farm remote from the cities and towns.

Sheriff Roark described the negro as being six feet two inches tall, with a black moustache, wearing a white hat, heavy coat, blue shirt, tan colored pants and a broad pair of shoes. The band of his hat has been removed, the rim slit open with a knife and the inside band pulled through. Sheriff Roark said the negro would be easily recognized by his hat.

There is a reward of \$300 offered for the capture of the negro, dead or alive, the governor having offered \$250 and the sheriff \$50.

DRINKING MORE BEER

Americans Are Cutting Whiskey Out For Lager. Washington, July 2.—Americans drank less whiskey during the past twelve months than they did the year before, but they consumed more beer and smoked more cigarettes.

Reports to the commissioner of internal revenue made public today showed that receipts for the fiscal year just closed totaled \$84,096 less than for the previous year, and most of this decline was due to the marked decrease in taxes collected on distilled spirits. Detailed statements for the month of June are not yet available, but in the first eleven months of the fiscal year there was a decrease of \$3,374,857 in the income from the manufacture and sale of distilled liquor, due in part to reduction in the number of licenses. Estimates on the decline in distilled liquor tax for twelve months will probably be \$1,250,000.

Receipts from tobacco of \$2,500,000 over last year. This gain is due almost entirely to a phenomenal increase in the cigarette trade. The gain in receipts from fermented liquor, beer, ale and the like, was about \$860,000.
