Business men of Anderson, ladies of Anderson and the baseball fans as one man, yesterday, asked those in charge of the local baseball situation to make every effort toward keeping the Anderson team in the Piedmont league. These individuals all assured those who are behind the effort to furnish good baseball for the city that they would go out during the remainder of the week and persuade friends and acquaintances to witness next week's games and it would seem that a bigger attendance will mark the three games for next week than has been the case since the season opened. There are enough loyal fans in Anderson to manage this undertaking in some way or another and if trying can keep the team here, then here it will stay.

Anderson Has The Wet Goods.


