Atlanta, Ga., July 9.—A decision as to the location of the new Methodist Episcopal University, east of the Mississippi river, will probably be made in this city Wednesday, July 15, at a meeting of the educational board of the general conference of the Methodist Episcopal church, south.

The committee named by the commission to consider various offers and invitations, will meet here next Tuesday, a call for both gatherings having been issued by Bishop Warren A. Candler, chairman of both the commission and the committee.

Atlanta Methodist have planned a strong fight for the university. The city council recently adopted resolutions endorsing the university project and offering aid.

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PACKING PEACHES FOR MARKET.

This Month Busy One for Growers of Fruit—How to Gather Them.

Clemson College, July 9.—During the next four weeks practically all of the peaches grown in the state for market will be shipped, according to C. F. Niven, assistant horticulturist of Clemson College.

Great care should be exercised when gathering peaches. They are very easily bruised and the least injury renders them unfit for shipping purposes.

When peaches are to be shipped in small baskets, holding from one dozen to two and one-half dozen, according to the size of the fruit.

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TWO CAR LOADS OF FINE STOCK.

Pure Bred and High Grade Animals Will Give Impetus to Stock Raising.

Clemson College, July 9.—Consisting of two carloads the second co-operative shipment of pure bred and high grade live stock was brought into South Carolina recently and the stock has now been distributed to purchasers in several counties.

There were forty-four head of stock in the recent importation. They were bought in Indiana and Illinois and it required much care and time to find good animals at reasonable prices.

The shipment included 9 Hereford bulls, averaging \$130; 7 Hereford females, averaging \$116; 11 grade Hereford heifers, averaging \$50; 8 Holstein heifers, averaging \$147; 1 grade Holstein heifer, \$45; 0 Angus bull \$100; 2 grade Percheron mares, averaging \$231.

One entire carload of cattle was unloaded at Westminster in Oconee county and it is expected that this large importation will give a strong impetus to the live stock industry in Oconee.
