COMPULSORY ATTENDANCE

Is Said to Work Wherever it Is T. ed.

When we hear of the wonderful results of compulsory education in England, Scotland or Germany we may argue "but these are foreign countries and what we suit them might not suit the United States." When Massachusetts and California report that they do not want to get rid of compulsory education which is bringing about such progress, we still have the old time argument left that we can't try it in South Carolina, because while educating ourselves we might educate the negro. But now, Mr. Editor, when reports from our own Southern states show that compulsory education of the white citizen is his defense against the negro who is already flocking into the schools, it seems that only the negro could fear the compulsory education of the southern white man.

Here is what Gen. V. O. Gilbert, assistant superintendent of public instruction in Kentucky, answers in a letter of the 8th inst. as to results in his state:

"First: We not only believe, but we know that the state has made greater educational progress under the compulsory law than before such a law.

"Second: Yes, the negroes were quite generally attending school before the compulsory law.

"Third: The compulsory law has increased the attendance of the whites greater proportionately than the negroes."

Financial and Commercial

New York Cotton

New York, July 14.—The cotton market was more or less unsettled during today's trading, an early advance being followed by reactions, with the close steady at a net loss of 4 to 8 points.

Reports of continued dry weather in the southwest, relatively steady cables, and the failure of the census report on supply and distribution to show as big a falling off in domestic mill consumption for the month of June as some of yesterday's sellers had expected, appeared to be responsible for an opening advance of 2 to 6 points.

Prices worked another point lower to 2 higher right after the call, but met a good deal of realizing, and offerings became heavier after the publication of the western forecast for cloudy weather in Arkansas and partly cloudy conditions in east Texas.

The summary of the week's weather report read bullish enough to cause a rally of several points shortly after midday, but the details by States were very encouraging as to conditions over the greater part of the belt, and the market eased off again during the afternoon.

As prices worked lower, local bears appeared to become somewhat more confident with new crop months selling 9 to 11 points not lower in the trading with December showing a reaction of twenty points from the best price of yesterday. Closing figures were 3 or 4 points up from the lowest on covering.

Cotton figures closed steady.

New Orleans Cotton

New Orleans, July 14.—Cotton today displayed steadiness in the early trading and closed very steady. During the middle of the session, however, values were not well sustained and prices went 8 points under the level of yesterday's last figures. In the early trading the market was 6 to 7 points over yesterday's final. The net results of the day's trading were a loss of 1 to 2 points.

Dry weather in the western belt and a forecast indicating more dry weather, good cables and a favorable statement on consumption in this country during June were the sustaining influences of the morning. The weekly weather reports, however, were regarded as highly favorable and led to a selling wave which put the market below the level of yesterday's close.

On the decline shorts were good sellers and the efforts of scalping in the afternoon to take their profits caused steadiness.

Cotton figures closed steady: July 1303; August 1233; October 1242; December 1244; January 1248; March 1256.

Spot cotton quiet unchanged. Sales on the spot 375; to arrive noon.

Liverpool Cotton

Liverpool, July 14.—Cotton spot steady; good middling 802; middling 750; low middling 702. Sales four thousand; speculation and exports 400. Receipts 6,000.

Figures barely steady. July 718; August 718; September October 674 1-2; November December 662; January February 662 1-2; March April 664.

Liverpool, July 14.—The cotton exchange here will remain in session until 6 p. m., on July 31 to receive the American government report on the condition of the cotton crop.

Cotton Seed Oil

New York, July 14.—There was heavy liquidation of August contracts for cotton seed oil, by commission houses early in the market session today and the market asked, influenced also by a light spot demand and reports of increased crude offerings. Covering in the last hour caused sharp rallies, however, and the market closed quiet steady at 1 point advance to 7 points decline. Sales 11,300 barrels.

Stocks and Bonds

New York, July 14.—The movement of stocks was irregular today, but the undertone in the associated issues was firm. Several bear raids attempted were abortive, except in the case of New Haven, which fell to a new record of 64 1-4, recovering about half its loss. The denunciation on the former New Haven management by the interstate commerce commission was uppermost in the mind of the financial community and acted as a detriment in investment circles.

In addition to New Haven, lower prices were registered by Canadian Pacific, in which the previous day's liquidation was lacking. They were intermittent bear onslaughts against New York Central, Baltimore and Ohio, and other issues of the same class, but support was invariably followed by sharp rallies. Good issues, the chief cause of the preceding week's unsettlement, were relatively strong.

Some of the manipulative special issues, as California Petroleum common and preferred and Central Leather, made substantial advances, but their market influence was negligible. Reduced dividends resulting

from poor earnings, were ordered by the directors of the Pacific coast Company on the second preferred and common stock.

London sold a considerable amount of the issues here, but a part of the selling was believed to have its origin at this center. Advances from several important trade centers, reporting curtailment of operations, were neutralized by word at the White House, predicting an early business boom in the middle west.

Bonds dealings covered a wide range, with fluctuations of 1 to 3 per cent. Total sales, par value, \$1,906,000. United States bonds were unchanged in call.

New York, July 14.—Heavy selling of New Haven forced that stock to the new low level of 64 1-4 early in today's session of the stock exchange. The balance of the list was extremely feverish.

Cotton Goods

New York, July 14.—Cotton goods markets were steady today, but quiet. Buying on men's wear gorges for spring was light. Attendance at the H. B. Claffin Sale was as good as on Monday and operations were full and steady.

Grain & Provisions

Chicago, July 14.—Despite increasing damage from black rust the wheat market today finally took a downward turn owing to export bids being out of line. The close was nervous 1-8 a 1-4 to 3-8c under last night. Corn showed a net loss of 5-8 a 3-4c to 1 a 1-8c, and oats of 5-8 to 1 5-8c. In provisions the outcome varied from a 7 1-2c decline to raise of 15c.

FEDERAL MONEY TO MOVE CROPS

Millions May Soon Be Placed By the Government As Done Last Year

(By Associated Press)

Washington, July 14.—Thousands of National banks already have replied to Secretary McAdoo's letter asking the opinion of bankers through out the country as to the advisability of lending government funds to banks to move crops. Many bankers urged the lending of government funds, as was done last year, when about \$37,000,000 was loaned to banks by the treasury department.

Mr. McAdoo also asked a number of other questions in his general letter. He sought advice as to the best centers for distribution of the money and the localities where it would be most needed. Clerks now are busy tabulating the replies.

It now seems unlikely that the federal reserve board will be organized immediately and Secretary McAdoo will not have his advice in arranging for crop movement money. While the three members of the board already confirmed will be sworn in before July 21, it is probable the board will not be called to meet as a body until after the confirmation of the other two members.

It is generally believed that Milton C. Elliott, secretary to the organization committee, will be retained by the board as legal adviser. Mr. Elliott had also been mentioned as successor to Charles A. Hamlin as assistant secretary of the treasury.
