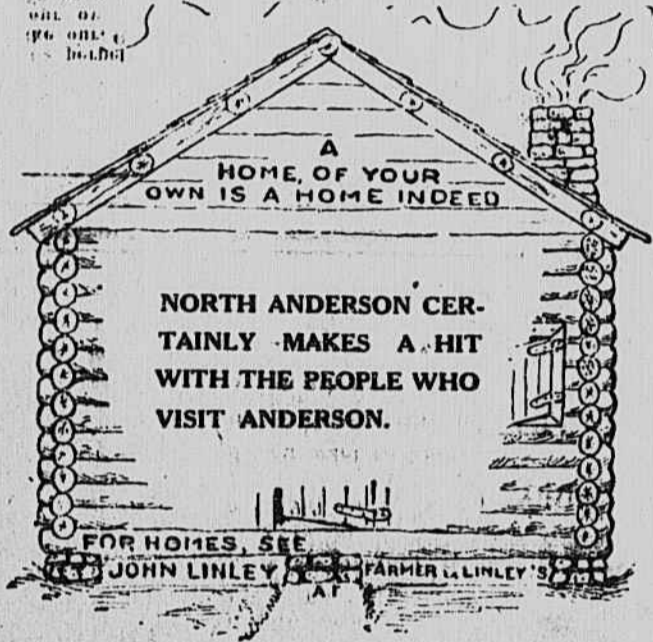

New Way to Kill Bugs. Electrical apparatus has been invented for killing insects which are harmful to the growth of trees and grain. A metallic net supported on a two wheeled vehicle is suspended over the ground where the insects are to be killed, and 6,600 volt energy is allowed to discharge from it to the ground. The net and the earth are energized from the one terminal of a step up transformer on the vehicle, the other terminal being grounded.
