NO INVESTIGATION

Financial and Commercial

New York Cotton

(By Associated Press.)
New York, July 17.—Confusing reports as to the action of Lancashire spinners with reference to short time proposals, seemed largely responsible for the irregularity of today's cotton market. Some of the easier cables created an impression here that the Manchester section had agreed to curtail production, but later advices stated that the only action had been preparatory to securing a vote on the proposition and the market became firm in the late trading with the close steady at a net advance of 14 to 16 points.
The crop report of a local authority, placing the condition at only 78.8 per cent against the report of 79 per cent toward the end of June was doubtless the factor on the opening advance of from 8 to 11 points. The active months sold 8 to 12 points net higher right after the call on covering and bill support. The deterioration shown in the condition figures, however, was east of the river where drought conditions have recently been relieved by good rains, and the market met considerable cotton on the advance.
Offering increased following the first reports from Manchester and prices reached within 3 or 4 points of last night's closing figures but soon steadied, while demand became more active in the late trading on covering by early sellers, spot house buying and reports of hot winds in the Southwest. New crop positions closed within a point or two of the best. The week end figures made rather a bearish showing but seemed to attract no special attention. General business was very quiet during the greater part of the day, and much of the trading was supposed to be in the way of evening up for over the week end, or pending a better view of weather and crop conditions in the west.

Cotton Seed Oil

(By Associated Press.)
New York, July 17.—Further liquidation of summer and fall positions again weakened cotton seed oil sharply today, last prices being generally 2 to 6 points, net lower. A great deal of oil was switched from August to September delivery. Crude was offered a little more freely, spot demand was light and about the only support came from refiners who covered shorts.
The market closed steady. Spot 723 a 727; July 725 a 727; August 731 a 733; September 732 a 733; October 706 a 709; November 671 a 675; December 655 a 659; Total sales 25,600.

Dun's Review.

New York, July 17.—Brandstreats will say tomorrow:
Reports this week spell betterment, moderate in some instances but totalling sufficient to deserve mention. Needed rains have fallen in some districts. The general crop situation has improved rather than retrograded, as is not unusual in July, clearance sales and hot weather have enlarged the turn over of summer goods and all parts of the iron and steel and related lines, such as agricultural implements, car building and repairing, show a continuance of the improved conditions recently noted.
There is evidence also that optimistic sentiment as to the future of trade and profit that the improvement is not entirely a matter of sentiment. It is had in the reports of a record movement of winter wheat to market, despite some holding by farmers not satisfied with present prices for raw wool and lanicry reports, from the automobile trade.
Ban clearings for the week ending July 16 were \$3,171,852,000, an increase of 5.1 per cent over last year; wheat exports 5,922,600 bushels against 3,599,406 last year; business failures 304 against 231.

New Orleans Cotton

New Orleans, July 17.—Dry weather in the western belt today again proved to be a strong sustaining influence in the cotton market. Showers that were predicted for Texas over night failed to materialize and the market stood at the rest all day. All day, however, increased and the advance was pared down to a very few points. In the afternoon the forecast of continued drought together with crop complaint for Texas stimulated buying and prices rose to the higher level of the session, standing 14 to 16 points over yesterday's last prices. The close was at a net gain of 13 to 15 points.
A bullish feature of the day was a private bureau report on condition showing a 46th since June 25 of 2 of a point but offsetting this was the first bale of the new crop in Georgia and cable messages from Liverpool stating that Lancashire spinners had unanimously voted to go on short time.
Cotton futures closed steady. July 1294; August 1277; October 1237; December 1238; January 1243; March 1252.
Spot cotton quiet, unchanged, middling 13 5-16; strict middling 13 11-16. Sales on the spot 443; to arrive none.

Stocks and Bonds

New York, July 17.—General liquidation again was an outstanding feature of the stock market today. The most prominent movement centered about low priced railroad shares. Missouri, Kansas and Texas common and preferred Denver and Rio Grande preferred Southern Erie, St. Louis and Southern preferred and Seaboard Air-Line receded from 1 to over 4 points.
Later the selling embraced a number of stocks and greater prominence, including the Anthracite shares, St. Paul, Pennsylvania and Baltimore and Ohio.
Numerous transactions in Baltimore and Ohio preferred were again for future delivery and various other high grade stocks and bonds changed hands in the same way.
New Haven was far less conspicuous, but its course was uncertain as a result of overnight developments connected with the road's future. An abrupt decline in the shares, was later regained and final dealings were attended by a general rally.
Money rates were notably easier. Offerings of commercial paper were more rapidly accepted.
Bonds were mostly heavy, after initial firmness. Total sales par value, aggregated \$1,675,000.
United States bonds were unchanged on call.

Weekly Letter

New York, July 17.—The cotton market has been comparatively quiet during the past week and fluctuations have been more or less irregular as a result of conflicting crop and trade reports. Uncertainty as to the effect and probable form of future legislation which Washington advices claim may be enacted during the present session of congress has probably had a tendency to restrict business. Trading also appear to be hesitating between the gloomy reports of prevailing conditions in mill circles as compared with predictions of general improving trade, under the stimulating influence of large grain crops, and between an optimistic view of the corn outlook and the river as apposed to apprehensions of drought damage in the southwest.
