CONGRESSMAN LEVER WILL SPEAK TODAY

COMES AT INVITATION OF CHAMBER OF COMMERCE

COTTON FUTURES

Tells of the Status of the Bill To Regulate the New York Cotton Exchange

Congressman A. F. Lever is in the city to address the farmers of the county today, by invitation of the chamber of commerce. His subject will be the "Smith-Lever bill," which has become a law and provides for extension of the agricultural teaching that is done by certain colleges in the south.

Mr. Lever was asked last night about the bill by Senator E. D. Smith to regulate the New York cotton exchange, and he said that as he had no connection with it he did not like to say very much about it except that the bill is in the conference committee and as soon as he gets back to Washington it will very likely become a law.

The bill was introduced by Senator E. D. Smith and its purpose was to curtail the speculative dealings in cotton. The bill was amended in the Senate by John C. Smith of Georgia, a careful lawyer and legislator. In order to meet some objections as to its constitutionality. When it came to the house, Mr. Lever as chairman of the agricultural committee took it up and has spent two months upon it, conferring with Mr. Houston, the secretary of agriculture, and with the legal department of the administration and he proposed a substitute which would be effective and at the same time constitutional. The provision which he has presented has already been tested by the courts. Mr. Lever gives all credit to Senator Smith for originating the bill in the senate, but says that the conference committee has not announced a decision as to which bill it will report for final adoption. All are working to the same end, to take the farmers out of the hands of the speculators, and the only difference is one of opinion as to the manner which will have the most efficiency. Mr. Lever is deeply convinced that his amendment is the proper solution, although he is not criticizing Senator Smith's original bill.

Mr. Lever is greatly impressed with the new Secretary of Agriculture, who is a South Carolinian, D. F. Houston and says that Mr. Houston is one of the greatest living Americans.

DOMESTIC EXPORTS

Washington, July 20.—Foodstuffs, cotton, cotton seed, oil and mineral oil, constituted half of the \$2,323,731,884 of domestic exports from the United States during the fiscal year of 1914. Their total value was \$1,065,688,460 or about \$38,000,000 more than during 1913, according to the figures made public today by the department of commerce.

Cleanliness in Food. Portland, Maine, July 17.—A physical examination of all persons handling food products was favored and the sweating and coloring of immature oranges was condemned in resolution adopted today at the closing session of the American Association of Dairy, Drug and Food officials.

GARLINGTON SUED FOR A LARGE AMOUNT

CAROLINA AGENCY COMPANY DEMANDS MONEY

AN ORDER ISSUED

Judge Prince Yesterday Decided That the Defendant Owes Company \$25,000

John Y. Garlington and the Semipole Securities major came up for review before Judge Prince yesterday. The case was started at the spring term of court in Richland county and was argued to a conclusion yesterday.

Some years ago Garlington established in this state a general agency for the State Mutual Life of Rome, Ga. He wrote a lot of insurance and later capitalized his general agency under the name of the Carolina Agency Company. A year or so later he used his stock in the Carolina Agency Company to get a charter for the Semipole Securities company, the avowed intention of which company was to organize an accident insurance company.

The Semipole Securities company got into the hands of speculators who wrecked it and the Carolina Agency company was also deeply involved, although it was a separate company. Subsequently the agency company was put into the hands of a receiver, Wade Hampton Cobb of Columbia, being appointed to that position. Garlington, on the terms of his parole from the state prison, is living beyond the border of the state, but is said to have property in this state.

Some time ago the case was brought before Judge Prince when arguments were made on the question whether or not a guardian ad litem should be appointed for Garlington while he was in the state penitentiary. Judge Prince ruled against Garlington's contention, that under the circumstances existing in this case, a guardian ad litem should not be appointed for him.

The case was then referred to A. D. McFadden, master of Richland county, to take testimony and submit same with his findings to the court. The master reported that Garlington is liable to the receiver of the company in the sum of \$25,000. The arguments today are on the ruling of the master as to admitting evidence, and as to his report that Garlington is indebted to the company in the sum named.

NEW HIGHWAY

Has Many Advantages in Addition to Being an Excellent Road.

The new highway to the North Carolina Highlands recently built Walthalla to Highlands, N. C., at a cost of about 25,000 paid jointly by the states of North and South Carolina and private citizens of North Carolina and South Carolina and Georgia, which is called the Trans-Montane Route, the Latin term for mountain being used because of similarity of the new route with the Trans-Montane Highway across the Alps was officially opened for traffic and motor truck service, daily, on July 13th, last.

There are five different features connected with the new route, which will undoubtedly make it the most used highway to the North Carolina highlands and resorts. They may be enumerated as follows:

1. It is the shortest route from all Georgia, Alabama, Florida, Mississippi and Louisiana; shorter than any other route for all of South Carolina except that part of the state lying within Spartanburg and York counties; and equally as short as any other route from Washington, and the east by connection with the New York Herald-Atlanta Journal National Highway at Williamston, S. C.

2. It is the best constructed highway, with the best grades, between the foothills and the highlands, parts of it costing \$1,600.00 per mile, or 4 miles of that part of it traversing Rabun county, Georgia.

3. Snow will not interfere with traffic in the winter no rains at any time during the year, it being so graded to prevent water soaking.

4. Motor truck service, passenger and freight has been inaugurated between Walthalla, terminus of the Blue Ridge railway, and Highlands, in the mountains, the connections thus being made putting Lake Toxaway within five hours of Atlanta, via connection with Southern railway at Seneca; for persons wanting to make the trip by train to Walthalla, and motor truck to Highlands and Lake Toxaway.

It goes through the highest and most scenic route to the Highlands. At Russell's half way up, a splendid mountain swimming pool has been built.

This new highway via connection with the National Highway, New York to Atlanta, at Anderson gives you a new and the shortest route to the North Carolina resorts via auto, and also via train, with motor truck connection. An autoist for instance may leave Atlanta or Columbia at 2 o'clock in the day and spend the evening and have supper at Lake Toxaway.

COL. ROBT. A. THOMPSON PASSING TO HIS REST

LAST OF SIGNERS OF ORDINANCE OF SECESSION.

DISTINGUISHED MAN

Began Life as Printer's Apprentice In this County—Served in the Late War

R. S. Thompson, commercial agent of the Piedmont and Northern Railway, was called to Walthalla yesterday, by the announcement of the extreme illness of his father, Col. R. A. Thompson. Col. Thompson is 87 years of age and his passing is due to the infirmities of age. He has had no suffering, but has been sinking for the last ten days and was just alive last night. Telephone connection could not be had with Walthalla last night after midnight.

Col. Thompson had a very distinguished career. He was one of those delineated from the Pickens district to the ordinance of secession, and he is the last survivor of the distinguished company of 100 men. He proved his earnestness by volunteering for the service and subsequently became a lieutenant colonel of the Second Regiment of Rifles, made up of men from Pickens and Anderson districts.

He began life as a printer's apprentice on the Pendleton Messenger, it is stated, although Char. A. Langston of this city is of the impression that he began on a paper published in Anderson years before the war. Col. Thompson was one of the founders of the Keowee Courier of Walthalla and made that paper one of the best in the state as it has ever been.

RAMBLINGS

No Candidate Has Votes Sewed Up. A well known Anderson politician, who has traveled over the county considerably for the past month, said yesterday that as far as this county was concerned in the governor's race, that it was any candidate's race up to this time. The great majority of voters, especially the mill people have not yet decided on their choice for governor and the candidate who gets some good work put in in Anderson county just now, will likely get the jump on his opponents.

An Interesting Question Brought Up.

Several gentlemen were yesterday discussing the races for district commissioners, when Whit McClure brought up the question: "Can the people of the city of Anderson vote on these commissioners?" Some argued that they could, while others claimed they could not, since they are not in a district. This is a question which may be worth looking into at once.

Gilmer Todd in Deep Trouble.

Determined that Rock Mills township shall have her share of office holders, Col. Gilmer Todd, who acquired the handle to his name by wearing a red shirt in '76, and later offering to raise a company of the same command to wipe Huerta and his crowd from Mexican soil, has about decided to offer for commissioner from his district. To a friend, he stated that in case he did run, he would announce himself thus: "On behalf of my wife and children, I announce myself a candidate for commissioner from my district, etc." As a platform orator, Col. Todd has the senatorial bunch beat the length of Panama canal. Not since the days of Sam Wilkes, has Anderson county boasted of an orator of Col. Todd's type. Even William Jennings Bryan is not in the same class and in case this Rock Mills citizen decides to shy his sash into the political arena, Anderson county will hear a silver-tongued orator with no superior.

Will Money Go Up On Coming Election? Those in position to know claim that many thousands of dollars changed hands in the governor's race, two years ago and there is some speculation as to whether this will be the case this year. In the last election come Greenville parties came to Anderson to cover bets offered to be covered by Bleasemen. The winners at that time state that they are again in position to cover bets offered by Greenville men or other parties on the election.

Forgot His Speech, Called on Lord. The boys are telling this on "Vick" Chesbro: Down at Long Branch school house the other day, several candidates addressed the voters. When it came Chesbro's time, he got up and began by saying: "Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen: When I got up here to address you, nobody but the Lord and myself knew what I was going to say. (Here he paused a minute.) And now nobody but the Lord knows what I am going to say."

FEDERALS IMPRISONED

On Board U. S. S. California, La Paz, Mexico, July 19.—By Wireless to San Diego, Cal., July 20.—News that General Huerta had planned to leave Mexico was communicated to the federal garrison today by F. D. Moore, British consul, in the hope that the information would bring about a cessation of hostilities. As soon as the constitution-alist troops under General Alvarado entered Guaymas on Saturday, a government detachment of Governor Maytorena was established. Ten federal partisans were imprisoned. Among the prisoners is Senator Martinez, one of the owners of the Naviero Line, on four vessels of which the federal garrison is steaming southward.

Located and Will Return to Detroit After Five Weeks' Absence.

Detroit, Mich., July 20.—Word was received in Detroit tonight that the Rev. Louis R. Fatmott, the temperance worker who disappeared from this city five weeks ago and who was located at Rib Lake, Wisconsin, Saturday, will return to Detroit tomorrow night.

FATAL EXPLOSION

Panama, July 20.—The premature explosion of a 4,800 lb. dynamite charge at Cucaracha slide today killed five workmen, four of them white and severely injured one white man and seventeen negroes.

THE TEXAS COMPANY

Charged With Violation of State Anti-Trust Laws in Oklahoma.

Atoka, Okla., July 20.—Proceedings were instituted in the district court here today asking that the Texas company, an oil pipe-line and purchasing corporation, and the Producer's Oil company and Central Petroleum company, producers of crude petroleum, be ousted from Oklahoma. The petition charges that the Texas company as parent corporation and the producing companies as subsidiaries violate the state anti-trust laws in their alleged combination.

Amos L. Beatty, of New York, general counsel for the Texas company, replying to the petition contested the jurisdiction of the district court. Ten days was allowed for the filing of the briefs.

FRATERNAL ORDERS MERGE

"The Maccabees" Name Detroit as Headquarters for the World.

Detroit, July 20.—By unanimous vote delegates representing the nights of the Maccabees in every state and the Canadian provinces voted here today in favor of the amalgamation of the order with the Knight of the Modern Maccabees. The latter organization ratified the proposed amalgamation at a meeting in Bay City a few weeks ago. The new organization will be known as "the Maccabees." Detroit will be headquarters for the world, it was announced.
