Fupid progress in the work of state wide tick cradication is reported by Dr. W. K. Lewis, inspector in charge. The work is be-ing done under the joint direction of emson College and the U. S. Bureau

of animal industry.

Preliminary work was begun July
I in Edgefield, Saluda, Lexington,
Aiken and Calhaun counties. This
work consists of locating infested
premises in order to have them ready,
for the actual work of cradication in these counties, which will begin next spring. The work is under a veterin-arian and a group of field egents. Dr. Lewis said that many people in-these five counties who are interestd. and willing to co-operate will clean their premises individually before next year, which will make the work of eradication in these counties sim-

pler and more rapid. Eradication work is going forward excellently in Charleston county es-pecially in the construction of dipping vats. Twelve or fifteen vats have been built in that county already and there is an expert on the ground who is devoting his time solely to this work. It is expected that by September 1 Charleston will have between 50 and 75 vats for dipping.

The interstate shipping station vat in Richland county was finished recently and a lively movement of stock through Columbia will probably begin is soon as the railroads have built the necessary free and uninfested pens Dr. Lewis said he knew of some ship pers in other states who are waiting for these pens to be completed to be-gin moying stock through Columbia.

the fish and game commission.

Owners of oyster beds are suffering losses and others are kept from going into the business of raising oysters by the prevalence of thieves, mostly nethe prevalence of thieves, mostly ne-groes who row out to the beds at night, steal the cysters and market them to discrupulous parties, often handling them in an unsanitary and dangerous way. The law would re-quire licensing of all dealers, the fees to go toward paying coast patrols who will keep unlicensed boatmen away from private beds.
