J. J. REGAN MAKES ANNUAL ADDRESS

FARMERS UNION STATE MEETING

MANY ALREADY HERE AND MORE COMING

OPENING SESSION

Began Deliberations Last Night With Very Successful Meeting—Go To Clemson Today

Anderson has entertained the politicians, Anderson has entertained the veterans and Anderson has entertained many bodies of much importance within the last year but no body more deserving of the hospitality of the community has ever been entertained here than that which is now gathered in Anderson—the State Farmers' Union.

Last night the first session of the union was held at 8:20 o'clock and was called to order in the court house by J. W. Rothrock, president of the Anderson county union.

The following committees were then appointed by the president: Credentials—J. W. P. Harmon, C. B. Yarborough, T. Y. Chalmers.

Resolutions—R. M. Cooper, Hugh Witherspoon, E. A. Rodgers. Constitutional Amendments—J. F. Williams, J. W. Shenley, S. P. Prossely.

Education—Dr. W. M. Riggs, M. I. Sams, Hugh Witherspoon. President's Address and Report of State Officers—E. J. Watson, J. B. Whetsell, J. O. Harris.

Hours of Meeting—J. W. Rothrock, J. M. Boyles, J. Whitner Reid. A committee made report that it had audited the books of the secretary-treasurer and found all these to be in splendid shape with correct balances and showing that the association was in good shape.

The secretary-treasurer then made his financial statement relative to the disbursement of funds during the last year, the money received, and the money now on hand. The union is in good condition from a financial standpoint.

The president's address was one of the features of the evening and it delighted the audience. Mr. Dabbs is wrapped up in the work of the farmers' union and he has labored early and late for the good of the organization.

Several amendments were proposed to the constitution and after these were read they were passed on to the committee on constitution. A number of resolutions were also referred to the committee on resolutions.

The most interesting feature of the evening was reached near the close of the meeting when the union took up the discussion of the activities of the local unions in different sections of the state.

After explaining the program for today, which calls for an additional session this morning upon the subject of the local unions, and a trip to Clemson College for dinner, the first meeting of the union was declared adjourned last night at 11 o'clock.
