"BOB" CRAWFORD BEAD.

Confederate Soldier Passes Away at the Age of 74 Years.

R. C. Crawford better known "Bob" Crawford, died at his home near Belton last Friday night after an filness of many months, though the cause of his death was heart failure.

Mr. Crawford was one of the brave soldiers in the rear ranks in service at the close of the Civil War in 1865 He was with Ceneral Lee when he surrendered and he was one of the bravest soldlers in the service. For four long years he fought for that which he thought was right. Mr. Crawford was wounded in the shoulder during the war and carried the ball in his body till death. The wound never healed and these long years this brave man has fought the battle of fate without a single mur-

He was a soldier of the crossmember of the Baptist church-and was 74 years old at his death. He leaves a heart-broken wife and several children to mourn their loss. The remains of this brave man were laid to rest at Cheddar cemetery Sunday afternoon in the presence of many corrowing relatives and friends.

Just three hours before Mr. Crawford died he asked his wife not to retire as he did not wish to be alone at the close of his carthly life. He wanted his wife, who had been his faithful companion for many years to be present at the last call of "taps". 
