Financial and Commercial

New York Cotton

New York, July 24.—So many private reports of showers in Texas and Oklahoma were received today that the cotton market developed quite a weak undertone and in the afternoon was subject to considerable selling pressure after which it was increased by cables reporting a very grave Austro-Serbian situation and by weakness in the stock markets. Closing prices were 8 to 15 points net lower and represented bottom figures of the day.

It was perhaps more hopeful than the ordinary conditions of yesterday and today in the southwest which would probably result in a spell of wet weather than any general or heavy rainfall, which accounted for today's more optimistic feeling among the bear traders. Cables were also affected by the rain news and their weakness was responsible for the opening partial decline of 2 points net. For a time afterward the market held steady and even showed occasional periods of firmness, notably when the Southwestern weather details failed to confirm all of the private reports of rain. Eastern belt advices were again conflicting, but on the whole gave little cause for apprehension.

Weekly statistics, particularly the small spinners' takings were considered rather bullish and added to the feeling of heaviness in the last hour. Cotton futures closed barely steady.

Cotton Seed Oil

New York, July 24.—Cotton seed oil broke severely for old crop deliveries under heavy liquidation and a stop loss selling, participating in the weakness in lard and poor demand for actual oil. Late positions were relatively steady. Final prices were 10 to 34 points net lower on near and unchanged to 3 net lower on late months.

New Orleans Cotton

New Orleans, July 24.—The cotton market today displayed weakness in the afternoon session under small mill takings for the week and reports of threatening weather in the western belt, which the trade construed to mean that there was a good chance of the drought being broken overnight. The close was at the lowest of the day, a net loss of 14 to 17 points on the new crop months. The old crops were not active and July closed nominal.

The weather map and the detailed reports from the weather bureau did not show any change of importance in weather conditions over the belt, and the continued dry weather in Texas and Oklahoma led to buying early in the day which gave the market a feebly tone. At the highest, however, the most active months were only one point over yesterday's closing level. At times considerable selling pressure apparently from the short side was in evidence.

Futures closed barely steady. Spot cotton quiet, unchanged, sales on the spot 32.

COTTON SEED OIL

Causing Much Excitement During a Break of 80 Points.

New York, July 24.—Cotton seed oil caused excitement on the produce exchange today when old crop positions under a heavy selling movement precipitated by weakness in lard and cotton broke from thirty to thirty-nine points. The market has been on the verge of a break for several days but until today it was believed that refiners were short of the old crop months and would relieve local holders of the oil they were carrying. The new crop contracts held relatively steady and closed with but small losses.

Grain & Provisions

Chicago, July 24.—Chances of war in Europe tended to sustain something of the advance in nearby deliveries of wheat today but failed to offset heaviness in the more deferred contracts. The market closed unsettled at 3-5 net, compared with last night's 3-3-1/2. In provisions, pork was a setback of 22 1/2 to 23 1/2 except for July pork, which held steady.

Stocks and Bonds

New York, July 24.—Reasons for the further decline in quoted values today lay largely on the surface. Austria's ultimatum to Serbia and the reported failure of the Ulster conferences were perhaps the most important factors.

Foreign markets were again demoralized. The London market, as well as Berlin, where the highest discounts prevailed, again sold stocks in considerable quantities. Canadian Pacific declined four points.

Eric and Southern Railways were offered at marked concessions for foreign holders and half a score of active issues including New York Central, Northern Pacific, Harriman, the Anthracites, United States Steel and Americanized copper receded one to three points. Contr. sold under any price quoted in over a score of years.

Foreign exchange continued firm, with a hardening tendency to time loans. Erie issues were the weakest of all bonds. Total sales, par value, \$3,028,000. United States coupon 4s declined 1-4 per cent on call.

Liverpool Cotton

Liverpool, July 24.—Cotton spot steady; good middling 786; middling 788; low middling 690. Sales 5,000; speculation and export 300; receipts 2,000.

Futures quiet and steady; July 716 1-2; July and August 715 1-2; September and October 695; December and January 665 1-2; February and March 667 1-2; April and May 669 1-2.

Cotton Goods

New York, July 24.—Sentiment in dry goods markets was much improved today by the result of the creditor's meeting of the H. B. Clafin company. Trade continues quiet in cottons and woolsens.

Dun's Review.

New York, July 24.—Further gradual improvement in the business is apparent at a time when a pause in mercantile and industrial activity is customary. Considerable irregularities still characterize reports of the leading centers. Yet favorable influences predominate. While complaints are heard of damage to the grain and cotton crops another prosperous year on the farms is virtually assured. Enhancement of values in iron and steel is a reflex of better conditions in that trade. In copper, a loss is pronounced and an easier trading attitude on the part of dry goods merchants is noted. There have been active openings of men's wear, yet new business is below that of a year ago. Advices from New England indicate that more activity has prevailed in foot wear than for some time. Leather showed improvement.

Complete official foreign commerce returns for June indicate that the balance of trade is still against this country. On the other hand, the nation's credit position abroad is likely to be strengthened in the future by a heavy out-go of all sorts.

Commercial failures this week are 353 against 298 last year.

Weekly Cotton

New York, July 24.—The cotton market has experienced another week of relatively small fluctuations with the trend upward for the first half of the week owing to the dry weather in Texas and Oklahoma. The appearance of showers on Thursday and Friday over parts of the drought served to relieve speculation and apprehension to some extent and the trend toward the end of the week became rather easy in tone.

Complaints have been received in Alabama and Georgia, and the Carolina which heretofore have been reported quite satisfactory prospects was not much bettered at the East. It was not believed that the Eastern belt situation had suffered any material set-back which timely rains could not overcome. In some quarters it was feared that rains in Texas such as are needed to be of any permanent benefit to the crop might result in increased activity of the boll weevil. Bulls also pointed out that the government report, which will be compiled as of July 25, is likely to reflect the unfavorable weakness in weather conditions in Texas.

Aside from weather reports there was not much news of importance during the week. New bales were received from Georgia, Alabama and Texas, although it was not expected that the movement would reach any large volume for a couple of weeks at least, whereas spinners are said to be short of white cotton which is very scarce and commands high prices. They have contracted for only a very small part of their future needs and hedging operations which are usually such a prominent feature at this season of the year have been almost entirely absent. Meantime speculative interest continues chiefly on the southwestern crop situation, which will doubtless exert leading influence on the market in the near future.

Washington, July 24.—Senate met at 11 a. m. Conference agreed upon a compromise with the house on cotton futures bill. Received in executive session special peace treaties with twenty foreign nations. Recessed at 5:55 p. m. to 11 a. m. Saturday.

House met at noon. House bill for federal supervision of grain inspections reported favorably. Representative Barbold, of Missouri presented five thousand remonstrances against prohibitional constitutional amendment.

Debate on general dam bill continued. adjourned at 5:45 until noon Saturday.
