New York Cotton

(By Associated Press.)
New York, July 29.—There was a feeling of relief in all speculative circles today over the announcement that efforts to localize the European war zone gave promise of success. This was particularly true of cotton, which not only showed less excitement but before the close developed very positive strength.

The opening was unsettled and very nervous with prices 10 to 22 points lower following weakness in Liverpool and conflicting war news, but after selling off to a net of 11 to 24 points, with August showing the most weakness, returning confidence in the foreign situation made itself manifest in general buying from all quarters, and the market advanced fully 25 to 32 points from the low levels, closing steady at 8 to 12 points net advance.

The upturn was aided by an active demand from spinners while there was a feeling in many quarters that the very high temperatures in Oklahoma and Arkansas more than offset the cloudy conditions in Texas. Further rains in the eastern belt led to favorable advices from that section. A private condition report issued at noon was about in line with those previously published and pointed to a slight increase in the coming government report.

New Orleans Cotton

New Orleans, July 29.—Cotton reacted rather sharply today from the downward movement based on European politics. The more favorable trend of cable news served to cause a pronounced buying wave on an over-sold market. From the lowest to the highest there was a rise of 26 to 29 points. The net change for the day was an advance of 12 to 13 points.

Weather reports were unfavorable on the whole, the drought in the West being unbroken, but little attention was paid to news from the belt.

Chicago, July 29.—Apparently increasing chances that war might be localized and prove brief tended to give the wheat market a sharp setback. Failures looked for had prices repeated. Yesterday's leap of nearly 10 cents did not develop. In consequence weakness characterized the close, with final values virtually the lowest of the day and 3 5-8 to 4 3-8 under last night.

Corn lurched downward with wheat however, suffering any unusual break. The wind up was unsettled, 1-4 to 3-4 net lower. Oats ruled easy, closing lower by a half to one eighth net. Longs and provisions on every decided advance.

Stocks and Bonds

New York, July 29.—The local stock exchange was almost the only market of importance at home or abroad to preserve its stability today, though at times, especially in the initial trading, storm signals were in evidence and a result of the semi-paralysis manifested by London and Berlin. Latest developments in the Serbian situation caused the British and the French markets to practically withdraw from active operations.

An unusual feature of the London market was the merely nominal quotations for many American issues, while those in which transactions were made declined 2 to 4 points. Opening prices were inclined to follow London's lead but a sudden reversal

followed an active buying on Canadian Pacific for Berlin.

An important factor in the advance here was the extensive purchases to investors, an element which has long been lacking in the financial district.

Prices were inclined to shade frequently during the mid-session on resumption of gold exports in moderate volume, followed by a 5 per cent rate for call money and some hardening for long maturities. Best prices were established in the final hour when foreign advices were increasingly encouraging.

Foreign exchange was again highly unsettled.

Business: shares was 200,000 shares under yesterday's active selling.

Bonds fluctuated widely, showing less recuperative ability than stocks. Total sales par value were \$3,275,000.

ually concentrating near the frontier. A military guard has been placed in the great flour mills at Corbeil, near Paris. The bankers in Paris are laying in a large stock and the city authorities today started forming a reserve store of 15,000 tons of flour.

The police department is exercising a general surveillance over Austrians and Germans in Paris. The perfect of police today ordered the discontinuance of the services of the public at tables on the sidewalks and on the terraces in front of cafes.

The government made an appeal to the press to keep calm and carefully to verify its news, concerning the crisis before publishing.

Long lines of deportees waited outside the savings banks today to withdraw their money as all payments will be suspended in case of war.

Late tonight there had been no change in the gravity of the situation and at the Elysee palace, President Poincare conferred until a late hour with the cabinet ministers. The government was continuing to reach a basis for the condonation of the hostile country. As a result of the crisis President Poincare has abandoned his contemplated vacation in the Alps.

Anti-War Crowd Disorderly.
Notwithstanding the order of the government prohibiting an anti-war meeting tonight called tonight by revolutionary labor organization, thousands of workmen assembled and tried to rush the cordons of police in order to enter the meeting place. Force scrimpage ensued and 250 of the rioters were arrested.

Assault Began.
Vienna, July 29.—The war spirit in the Austrian capital is hourly increasing. The streets of Vienna tonight were crowded with enthusiasts so that traffic in the leading thoroughfares was almost stopped.

A dispatch to a Vienna paper says three of the Danube flotilla began shelling Belgrade early in the morning after the Serbians destroyed the bridge across the Sava. The shells damaged the king's palace, the fortification walls, the barracks and other buildings. This dispatch says the Serbians did not return the fire.

German Hold Meeting.
Berlin, July 29.—An important official conference on the Austro-Serbian situation was begun here early this evening and continued until a late hour tonight. When it adjourned it was announced that nothing concerning the conference or its results would be made public tonight.

It is understood that the conference includes the heads of Dr. Bethmann-Hollweg, foreign minister; Admiral von Tirpitz, minister of marines, and one of the emperor's aide de camps, a number of the commanding generals of the German army.

Troops Will Mobilize.
It was reported in circles tonight close to the Austrian embassy, that a mobilization of the German forces tomorrow was highly probable.

No confirmation of this report was obtainable.
