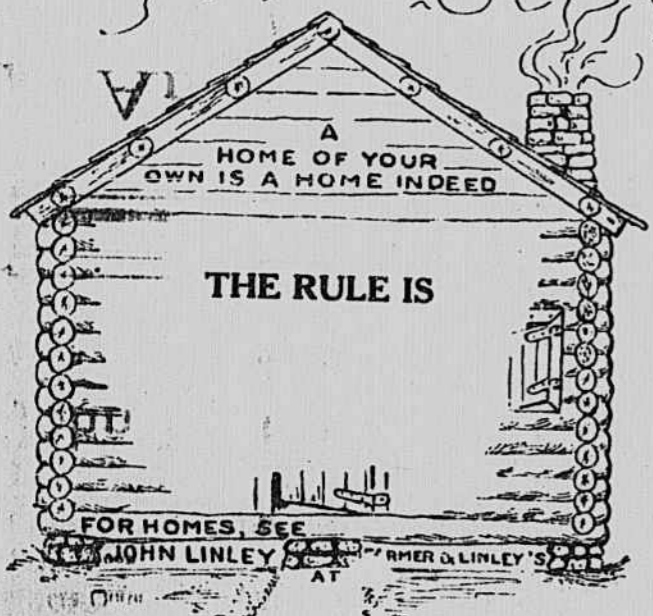

Rains Over All North Carolina. Walter Beatty, manager of the Southern Bell Telephone company in this city, returned yesterday from Charlotte, where he has been on a business trip. Mr. Beatty says that while the Anderson people were quarreling Tuesday morning about the continued dry weather, a perfect downpour was falling in Charlotte. He says that the rain started early Tuesday morning and continued until nightfall. It did not rain in Anderson until well up in the afternoon.

Country People At The Convention. A number of country people from all sections of Anderson county were in the city early yesterday morning and late last night. In the morning they were en route to the Salt and Baptist association, which is now in session in Iva, and in the evening they were returning to their homes. Negroes Will Break Contracts. Fred Wells, a negro, was hauled into Magistrate Broadwell's court yesterday on the charge of violating a contract. This is one of the favorite pastimes. Nearly all the negroes and each day sees some one of them brought up on this charge. Wells was found guilty and sentenced to pay a fine of \$20 or to serve for 30 days and as he did not have the coin, he was sent to the rock pile.

Union Grove To Have Festival. The ladies of Union Grove church are now preparing for an ice cream festival which they will hold at Union school house on August 1. The festival will last from 4 o'clock in the afternoon until 10:30 o'clock in the evening and it is expected that quite a number will be in attendance.

Storm Also Brought Hail. The rain which fell over different portions of Anderson county on Tuesday afternoon was very welcome to the farmers but it cannot be said that the hail which accompanied it to the Rock Mills district was appreciated. It is said that considerable damage resulted near Rock Mills from the fall, but so far as known, but little damage was done elsewhere.

THE COOLEST PLACE IN ANDERSON

European War Bulletin

(By Associated Press.)

Athens, July 29.—The Serbian legation has received the following telegram from Nish, dated July 29:

"During the night Belgrade was bombarded. Shells fell in various quarters of the town causing great damage. Several fell on the Franco-Serbian and the Andrejitch banks. M. Andrejitch, of the banking firm, was wounded. Both banks have lodged a protest at the German legation.

"An artillery duel is proceeding at Vichnitsa, about 3 1-2 miles down the river from Belgrade."

Brussels, July 29.—Military movements in Belgium are being pushed rapidly, following the decision of the Belgian cabinet today to immediately call out three classes of the army reserves. By tomorrow night 100,000 men will be equipped and ready. The forts around Liege and Namur are receiving war equipment and the bridges are being mined.

A special train is at Arlon, capital of Belgium Luxembourg, ready to carry the garrison to the north.

Shanghai, July 29.—The British far western fleet is mobilizing at Wei-Hai-Wei, on the north coast of Shan-Tung province. The German fleet is mobilizing at Tsing-Toa, about 200 miles to the south.

Brussels, Belgium, July 29.—The Belgian cabinet today decided to call out immediately three classes of the army reserves.

Portland, England, July 29.—The British fleet sailed from here today for an unknown destination. No information could be obtained from naval officials as to the movements of the war vessels.

Gibraltar, July 29.—Spain has ordered every available warship to assemble at the Balearic Isles in the Mediterranean.

St. Petersburg, July 29.—An Imperial Ukase issued by the emperor tonight calls to the colors an immense number of reservists.

London, July 29.—It is stated in connection with the blowing up the railway bridge across the river Save by Servians that the Austrians have another bridge in sections on their side of the river which they can put up in a few days.

Vienna, July 29.—All Servians liable to military service residing in Austria-Hungary are being arrested and are being handed over to the military as prisoners of war.

London, July 30.—A Vienna dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company says: "After a heavy bombardment by the Danube gunboats, Belgrade was occupied by the Austrian troops Wednesday."

Semlin, July 29.—A great fusillade across the Danube last night led the Servians to expect a serious attack by the Austrians, whereupon they blew up the bridge.

St. Petersburg, July 29.—The Novoe Vremya says the Austrian Emperor has addressed a personal letter to Emperor Nicholas which is likely to have important influence on the crisis.

that if the governor had seen what a hole this explanation would have put him in, he would have agreed that it would have been wiser to refrain from making this explanation.

The Emerson case in Anderson was also discussed and the denunciation elicited much applause.

W. P. Pollock characterized the governor as a "broken-down spavine-bone" and a "feather-legged shambler" who did not dare stay on the stand a single time during the campaign and hear his record discussed. Another time he said Blease was too much of a coward.

This speaker made so much sport of the governor's decrying of factionalism and accused the chief executive of being the chief instigator. "How many times," he asked, "had the Blease forces been causing in the rooms of the supreme court in Columbia to which meetings only died in the wool, Bleases were admitted?"

The shooting of Dr. McIntosh, the speaker said, was an effort to destroy the evidence which would come from the mouth of Dr. McIntosh at the Richmond meeting, in case the physician was allowed to attend.

At Tillman's Rejoinder. Senator Smith made today his usual speech accounting for his stay in Washington. He began by speaking feelingly of Senator Tillman's condition. "If it were not for the limitation of flesh, the senator would," Mr. Smith explained, "would ask no greater gift of God than to be here in the thick of the fight. Though Senator Tillman had suffered much in the last two years the eye of the old warrior still glistened and the en-

thusiasm warmed when he talked of the issues at stake here," Senator Smith explained.

The senator said he knew no factionalism. He had received the largest vote ever given any one for the office, this without regard to vocation, avocation or profession.

His platform then was as it is now, "to see that the agricultural interests of the state get the privileges to which they are entitled." He was running against no one. They were running against him, the senator explained. He concluded amid great applause.

TO LIMIT TIME OF HOLDING OFFICE

An Amendment To Abolish Life Terms in Office Will Be Advocated

(By Associated Press.)

Washington, July 29.—A constitutional amendment to provide against life tenures in office and to make elective all federal judges except those of the supreme court, and all United States district attorneys, marshals, revenue collectors and postmasters, was introduced today by Representative Moon, of Tennessee. Mr. Moon, who is chairman of the postoffice committee, said he would press the measure at the next session of congress.

The text of the proposed amendment follows: "Hereafter it shall be unlawful for any person to be appointed or elected or chosen to an office or position or service of any kind under the authority of the United States or any state of the union, for life or for a term of

service longer than fifteen years in duration.

Hereafter all judicial officers of the United States, inferior in jurisdiction to the supreme court, all United States marshals, United States district attorneys, United States revenue collectors and postmasters shall be elected by the legally qualified voters of the state, district or civil division thereof, in which they shall be required to serve. Congress shall fix the districts, terms of office and the time, place and manner for holding such elections and make all other needful laws and regulations to enforce this amendment.
