ELECTRIC CRY SPARKLETS

Items of Interest and Personal Mention Caught Over the Wireless on the Streets of Anderson

Elmwood Merchant Here Yesterday.
How would you like to travel around over the country with \$250,000 worth of diamonds crowded down into your vest pockets and your trousers pockets? That is what Anderson had the unique pleasure of witnessing yesterday when S. K. Jonas of New York city arrived in town. Mr. Jonas imports his own diamonds and travels for his own firm. He does not believe in risking suit cases and handbags for carrying the valuable gems, but instead he carries them on his person and he had a wonderful assortment here yesterday. This was the first time that he had ever been to Anderson and he said a number of nice things about the town.

Hard at Work Copying Names.
Four clerks have been engaged by County Chairman S. Dean Pearman for the purpose of copying names from the registration books and these men have gone to work. The copying of these names is quite a task and it is going to take the clerks several days to get it completed. When all the registration books come in it is estimated that there will be about 7,800 names on the lists and this will be sufficient to take all four of the clerks at least a week to finish copying. The enrollment in this county is far larger than anyone expected.

Vote Saturday On Combining Schools.
The county board of education yesterday announced that it had chosen next Saturday for the date on which the election will be held in the Mt. Airy, Airy Springs and Mt. Springs districts to determine the advisability of having these schools consolidate. It is said that some of the school patrons in the districts concerned want the consolidation to take place, while others oppose it, but the general opinion seems to be that the vote for consolidation will exceed the anti-vote.

Interested in the First Speaking.
Throughout the county considerable interest is being evinced over the first campaign speaking, which will be held next Saturday at Honea Path. Some of the mill voters have already had an opportunity to hear the speeches but at these meetings all of the candidates have not been present and it is not thought that the outline of the various platforms were as complete as they may be when the regular campaign opens. Indications are that there will be a large attendance from all parts of the county and doubtless there will be a large attendance from Anderson.

Epworth League Going Into Camp.
Members of the Epworth League of St. John's Methodist church are now busily planning for a camping trip, which they will go on within the next few days. The party will go to Halfway Ferry on the Savannah river and there go into camp for a week's stay. They are all looking forward to a big time and they will hardly be disappointed.

Well Pleased With Business Conditions.
W. R. Taylor of Greenville, one of the officials of the Southern Railway, with offices in Greenville, spent yesterday in Anderson and while here told a reporter for The Intelligencer that his road was very well pleased indeed with the volume of business they get out of and for Anderson. Mr. Taylor says that business conditions in this section of the state just at this time are decidedly good.

Anderson Man Got Scholarship.
Dispatches from Columbia yesterday announced that the teachers' scholarships at the University of South Carolina had been awarded in the various counties and that F. L. Bowen of Anderson secured the scholarship for this county. Mr. Bowen deserved to win and he will receive congratulations from many friends.

Anderson Folk to Visit Capital.
Following the announcement of the Southern Railway to the effect that an excursion will be run from this section of the country to Washington and Virginia points on Wednesday, August 12, a number of local people have announced their intention of going. This excursion is an annual affair, at which time lower rates are granted than at any other season of the year. The railroads have announced a round trip rate from Anderson to Richmond, Va., of \$10.50 and the same figure to Norfolk, Va. There will be many from this city to visit all the points named.

Georgia Man Visiting Here.
Rev. Fred Tucker, of Demorest, Ga., is spending a few days in the city with his father, C. L. Tucker, on Elizabeth street. Mr. Tucker has been in school in Georgia for the last two years. After he had completed two years of his course he was made assistant pastor of one of the Demorest churches and he is now the pastor of that church. He has a number of friends in Anderson and they are all pleased to see him back again.

Another Candidate For Legislature.
H. B. Hendricks of the Brabry Creek section spent part of yesterday in Anderson and while here told some of his friends that he is considering entering the race for the house of representatives from Anderson county. Mr. Hendricks is one of the best known planters of his section and enjoys a large acquaintance in all sections of the county. Should he decide to enter the race he will most certainly be heard from and it now seems that he will get in.

Dr. Patrick to Preach Sermons.
Anderson people will all be interested in the announcement that Dr. R. G. Patrick, formerly president of Judson college at Marion, Ala., will occupy the pulpit of the First Presbyterian church of Anderson, both in the morning and evening services today. Dr. Patrick is a brother of Mrs. W. W. Sullivan and he has a host of friends in this city. He is one of the south's most prominent divines and he will probably be greeted by a large audience at both these services.

Changes Made In Businesses.
August 1 is a date when the "mid-summer" changes go into effect with the business firms around the town. Several houses make their changes of this date if any are to be made. E. P. Vandiver, recently elected vice president of the Peoples Bank of Anderson, assumed his new duties with this well known institution yesterday and was greeting his friends there throughout the day. Frank Brownlee, a well known young business man of the city has assumed his duties with the E. O. Evans company and went to work yesterday.

Brown Building Is Being Rented.
S. D. Boykin, one of Anderson's well known watchmakers and jewelers, with headquarters now located in the Anderson hotel building, has rented one of the buildings now being erected by D. C. Brown on East Whitner street and will move into the new place as soon as it is finished. Mortimer McGovern has also rented one of these buildings for his grocery store and Mr. Brown says he has practically closed deals for all the remaining buildings. No matter how fast business buildings are put up in Anderson, there are always occupants to be found for them.

Things Quiet At Chamber of Commerce.
Things have been painfully quiet at the chamber of commerce for the last few days, the explanation of this fact being that Porter A. Whaley, the secretary of the local association, has

been in Charlotte for a brief stay. The atmosphere of the whole town seems to change when this live wire is away and the people of the city almost instinctively know that Mr. Whaley is out of town. He returned to the city last night and said that he had a fine trip, and is hopeful of success of a proposition upon which he is working for Anderson county.

Invited to Attend Merchants' Jubilee.
A number of Anderson people have received invitations from Columbia to attend the Merchants' Jubilee, which will be held in that city on August 11, 12. It is said that 15,000 of these invitations have been distributed all over the state and there will be hundreds of South Carolinians to spend those two days at the capitol. The program for the two days calls for a number of interesting events, including automobile rides, a luncheon, a banquet, a baseball game and various other amusements. A barbecue at the Riverside club is also to be a feature of the two days.

Miss Beck Will Leave Anderson.
Miss Forella Beck, who has been employed as stamp clerk at the local post office for some time past, has been promoted and will leave within the next few days for Concord, N. C., where she will accept a better position in the postal service. Miss Beck by her courteous attentions to the patrons of the local post office, has made herself very popular with the public and her departure will be regretted.

News From the Hospital Patients.
