MAY START WAR ON PRICE ON SEED GERMS

It is possible that Clemson college may put in a plant for making a serum for inoculating vetch. It is almost essential to the success of vetch planting to have bacteria to make the seed germinate successfully.

The demonstration agents in the state report now that twice as much small grain is harvested as there was a few years ago, and the farmers should be encouraged yet more to engage in the production of grain.
