**A NEW SYSTEM**  
In place of One Point for Shooting Tournament, Meets Will be held at Five Different Places.  
(By Associated Press.)  
Washington, August 8.—The national rifle association matches will be conducted under a new system this fall. In place of a tournament at one central point it has been decided to divide the country into five divisions and hold and N. R. A. matches in each division.  
The matches of the eastern, known as division A, which includes Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Connecticut, New York, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Delaware, Maryland, Virginia, West Virginia and the District of Columbia will be held at the Sea Girt, N. J., range beginning August 24.
