The people of Anderson will probably enjoy the best time of their lives on the night of August 23, when they will be given a royal feast by the local post of the Salvation army. The plan for this night was announced some time ago by Ensign Belcher, and he has been hard at work on perfecting the arrangements for the last fortnight. Mr. Belcher announced yesterday that he is progressing with his preparations but he says all the people of the city should lend whatever assistance they can, since this is no small undertaking. His plans for the evening call for a program, consisting of recitations, etc., and then he plans to give every one present as much attention as possible, providing them all with refreshments. This should be a very successful undertaking.

Anderson Elks Were Interested.

Members of the B. P. O. Elks in Anderson were all interested yesterday in a picture shown at the Bijou Theatre--a reel showing the Elks' parade in Denver during the grand lodge of the order. A number of South Carolinians are in the parade, among these being J. Tom Hoyt, past exalted ruler of the Anderson lodge. Those seeing the picture yesterday have told their friends and last night the Elks managed to have Mr. Bristol keep the picture over for today. It will be shown again this afternoon and also tonight.

Big Crowd Here Yesterday.

Yesterday was not a sales day and there was no extraordinary events going on, but notwithstanding that fact, the country people in the city numbered more than did Saturday's crowd. Merchants around town reported that they enjoyed a better business on Monday than they did Saturday and Anderson county evidently does not reflect the cry of "hard times" being heard in some other section of the State.

Experience Teaches A Very Dear School.

Tom Jones, black as the ace of spades, has probably concluded by this time that experience does teach a lead school. There is no regular meeting scheduled for tomorrow at any point, but it is understood that a big picnic has been arranged at Walker-McElmoyle and practically all of the candidates will go there to deliver addresses. It will be a relief to part of the candidates and all of the voters when the campaign is concluded.

Fond Hope Is To Be Realized.

One of the officials of the Piedmont & Northern lines yesterday told a reporter for The Intelligencer that the fond hope of the Interurban of putting on chair cars on its lines will be realized within the next week or two. These cars have been manufactured by the High Point Car Co., of High Point, N. C., and several strikes and other troubles have delayed them. The cars were to have been put in service here May 1 but the official said yesterday that they would certainly be in use not later than September 1.

Now Planning For Next Year.

J. O. Ducworth, who is one of Williamson's best business men and president of the chamber of commerce of that city, was in Anderson

yesterday and while here told a reporter for The Intelligencer that plans are already under way for the holding of a second farmers' chautauqua in Williamson next year. The chautauqua just closed at Williamson was the first thing of its kind ever attempted in the south and the people were not very familiar with the idea, but since the first chautauqua was such a success there is now a strong sentiment in favor of the second one being held next year.

Let Contract for The Theatre Today.

It is understood that the directors of the Anderson Development Co. will meet today and will let the contract for the erection of Anderson's handsome new theatre. It is said that all negotiations have been concluded and that nothing remains now except the signing of the papers. The new theatre is to cost approximately \$55,000, including the store rooms and office buildings, and will be the handsomest place of its kind in the two Carolinas. It will have a larger stage than any theatre in Atlanta and will be magnificently fitted up in every way.

Merchants' Jubilee Is on in Columbia.

Today marks the opening day of the "Merchants' Jubilee." Several of the retail merchants in Anderson have received invitations to be present for the two days of the jubilee and it is presumed that Anderson will have one or two representatives in Columbia for the two days. The program as arranged by Columbia merchants calls for an elaborate two days of pleasure and business combined and every merchant making the trip will be benefited according to the statement of the Columbia men.

Finishing Up All Arrangements.

S. Dean Pearman, chairman of the Anderson county democratic executive committee, yesterday received 25,000 state election tickets to be used in Anderson county on August 25--the date of the first primary election in this state. Mr. Pearman also placed an order yesterday with local printers for 25,000 county election tickets and he will have these in hand within the next few days. So far as can be seen, Anderson county is now ready for the election and with most of the voters it seems to be a case of "the quicker the better."

Maybe for Better But Probably Worse.

Some Anderson people, claiming to know whereof they speak, say that the marrying craze seems to have struck this section and they claim that the latter part of August and the first of September will see more of this "getting hitched" business than ever before. One Anderson jewelry dealer said yesterday that he had heard of the reports and on the strength of it is going to New York next week to replenish his stock in order that gifts will be plentiful.

Judge Breazeale Attended Meeting.

Judge J. E. Breazeale is expected to return to Anderson today from Winthrop College, Rock Hill, where he has been attending a meeting of

the Winthrop College trustees. This meeting was called by President Johnson and thus far there has been no statement given out to the press as to what was its purpose.

Anderson Is Making Strides.

Speaking yesterday of the new paraffinaria he has purchased for his optical parlors, Dr. M. R. Campbell says that his new outfit will put him right on a level with the best shops in the south. He has purchased a complete outfit for grinding lenses, consisting of a grinding machine, a surfacing machine and an edging outfit. All these machines will be run with separate motors and Dr. Campbell will then be able to fit any patient with glasses. He expects to have his new machinery installed and ready for operation before September 1st.

Change In A Land Company.

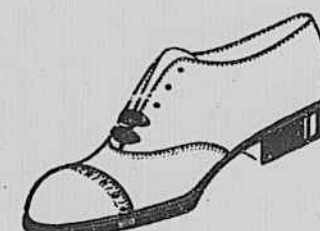

Are Likely to be Arrested at Any Time As Suspicious Characters

New York, August 10.--The Aero club of America today requested Secretary of State Bryan to give his office to learn the whereabouts of President David Todd of Amherst college, in Russia on a scientific mission. Professor Todd, who is a member of the aeronautical map committee of the Aero club, went to Russia to photograph an eclipse of the sun, intending to use an aeroplane in the work. He was last heard from at Liban on July 16.

The Aero club also renewed its request to Mr. Bryan that he try to effect the release of Mr. and Mrs. Archer M. Huntington of New York, arrested recently at Nuremberg, Bavaria, as spies. Mr. Huntington was collecting aeronautical maps for the organization, and it is believed the arrest was due to the fact that Mr. Huntington had these maps in his possession.

FOR SOUTH AMERICA.

This Country Should Know the Opportunities That Await. (By Associated Press.) Chicago, Aug. 10.--Dealers from the Eastern and Southern coal fields who have approximately 350,000 tons of coal ready for shipment to South America as soon as transportation is available, have recommended the organization of an official board of commerce to instruct business men of the needs, finances and transportation questions of the South American trade, according to an announcement today by the Black Diamond, the organ of the trade.
